### **Council News**

The Parish Council has held its Annual Council Meeting where it elects councillors for posts of responsibilities, membership of committees and working groups. Simon Hand was elected Chair for the forthcoming Council year and Sheelagh Cohen Vice-Chair. At this meeting, the Council has to undertake a statutory review of its policies such as financial regulations and its insurance cover. This will be the last year of the current Parish Council with an election for a new Council in May 2020.

As mentioned in the last Council News a vacancy has occurred on the Council due to the resignation of Grant Woodall and there has been no request for an election so his replacement will be by co-option at the Council's June meeting. Since then lain James has also resigned and the same process will be used to fill this vacancy. The Council would like to thank

lain for all his work and contribution to the Council, in particular the professional way he addressed matters. Staff and Councillors wish him all the best in his future endeavours. If you are interested in becoming a Councillor, which will be for a year until the next Parish Council election, please contact the Parish Clerk as soon as possible.

In the May local elections Adam Manning was re-elected as Borough Councillor for Hamble and Netley. There are three Borough Councillors for our area and he re-joins Malcolm Cross and David Airey to represent us on the Borough Council.

The Council is greatly concerned about a recent planning decision relating to the river off Hamble Foreshore. This area is protected by policies such as Mooring Restriction Zones, more commonly known as 'Blue Areas', to protect the open nature

and views in these important areas of the river that are enjoyed by parishioners and visitors alike. The Council has taken this matter up with the Borough Council Planning team as it is concerned this may set a precedent that will be to the detriment and possible loss of these areas which it was thought these polices were there to protect.

In the last magazine, it was mentioned that the Council had written to the Borough Council on a number of issues of concern such as the withdrawal of the consultation on a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) for Hamble and we have now posted the responses to these on the Parish Council's website, which may be of interest. The Parish Council would like to thank the local police for using a dispersal order over the warm Easter period and their proactive approach to deterring antisocial behaviour on the foreshore and surrounding areas.

As you may have seen, at various locations in the village in May, a traffic count was undertaken which was commissioned by the Parish Council. Much of Hampshire County Council's traffic survey work and proposals have been focussed on the upper end of Hamble Lane but the Parish Council felt it was important to have more data so it can respond to future planning applications that affect the village and traffic on Hamble Lane. The Parish Council's traffic count was to assess traffic volumes within the village and specifically

about where traffic joins Hamble Lane, the time of day it does so and journey times between key points.

The Parish Council has agreed to appoint a planning company to provide advice regarding the forthcoming Cemex consultation ahead of a planning application from them to extract minerals from the former airfield. Cemex has indicated that it expects to start its community consultation in the autumn. The Council has also agreed to commission a company to undertake a community -wide consultation exercise regarding the future use of Mount Pleasant Recreation Ground.

Please come and join us on 4th June to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of D-Day and the departure of the landing fleet from the Hamble River. The event will be held on the Foreshore starting with a Parade at 11am. Access via the High Street will be restricted from 10.45 until 11.30am when the parade will have completed its route.

The Farmer's Market last month was again blessed with good weather hence was very well attended. Please remember the new village event on the Foreshore on 1st June, a Brocante style flea market together with marine memorabilia. A wide range of items will be for sale from 40 traders and enthusiasts, many of which will be happy to share their knowledge.



### HAMBLE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERS



Last month we assisted Eastleigh Borough Council with clearing dead vegetation from an area on Hamble Common to aid the recovery of heather growth that was struggling to overcome the lack of light arising from rotting brambles and ferns. It has also become clear that our efforts to clear bamboo from Heather Gardens, although impressive, are only the start of a campaign as the bamboo shows signs of a strong revival.

During the nesting season our focus changes as we reduce the amount of shrub clearance; however, there are many alternatives; path repair is a priority as without a firm obstruction, free surface access to the Common is restricted to those with high mobility. We also plan to carry out maintenance of public seating on the Hamble waterfront. Unfortunately, the advent of the holiday season brings with it a significant increase in rubbish that needs to be cleared before it becomes hazardous to wildlife.

Regardless of the task we welcome volunteers and, although, the tasks can be arduous, there are roles for a wide range of agilities. Furthermore, we appreciate that many people cannot spare the time for the whole task so please do not be put off if you can only be with us for a short while.

### **THE NORMANDY LANDINGS IN 1944**

Stan Rickeard was born in Netley in September 1925. He was amongst the first cohort at the newly built Hamble Secondary School which opened in 1937. After leaving school in 1940 Stan started training on an Electrical Work Scheme with Air Service Training in Hamble. He joined local sea cadets in 1942, and then volunteered to join the Royal Navy in 1943; and was posted to Gosport in early 1944.

As you may know, D-Day was originally planned for the 5th June 1944, so many of the vessels including those from Hamble departed on the 4th June 1944. The ships met at a rendezvous point nicknamed 'Piccadilly Circus', south-east of the Isle of Wight where, due to the bad weather, all the vessels had to wait until Operation Neptune (D-Day) could commence early on the 6th June 1944. Operation Neptune was the codename given to the amphibious aspect of Operation Overlord, which was the codename given to the Allies plan to secure a foothold in Europe.

Shortly after D-Day Stan completed his training and started working as a seaman performing general duties on a Landing Ship Tank (LST). Their vessel, LST 199, was based in Portsmouth and it was used to deliver tanks, troops and equipment to Juno beach near Courseulles-sur-Mer in Normandy. The upper deck of the LST was loaded first using a large lift which had to be constructed every time the upper deck was loaded. The lift had to then be dismantled before the lower deck could be loaded with the tanks, which had to reverse on so that they could be driven off forward. All the vehicles and equipment had to be chained to the decks for the journey. The return journey time varied depending on weather and tides. When the tide was right, the LST would accelerate towards the gently sloping Normandy beach, and as the hull started to touch the ground, they would drop the kedge anchor at the rear of the ship which would be used to help re-float the LST for the return journey. The bow doors were then opened, and a ramp was lowered. The tanks would leave first, and then the vehicles and equipment on the upper deck would be off-loaded. Stan recalls the overpowering stench of the fumes from the tanks revving their engines.

The LST was used to deliver vehicles. cargo and troops directly onto shore where there were no docks or jetties. There were several different models of LSTs, but their average size was about 110-metres long, 15-metres wide, and they all had a special keel that allowed the ship to be beached and to stay upright. Each one could transport around 18 tanks on the tank-deck and other vehicles, supplies, or troops on the upper deck. They could travel at a maximum average speed of around 10-12 knots. Whilst the original LSTs were developed in the UK shortly after Operation Dynamo (the evacuation of Dunkirk) in 1940, the vast majority of the fleet of over 1,000 were built in the USA. The special keeled boats were not very stable in the open sea, but they had to be sailed across the ocean in convoys to reach the battle fronts around the world.

After unloading the LST, Stan and the rest of the crew would have to wait until the next high tide before returning to Portsmouth. Sometimes the crew had time to disembark on to the beach for a break or kick-about with a football. The

LST usually returned with casualties and their attending medical staff or prisoners of war who were accompanied by their guards. Some of the crew, and their LST, had previously seen action in the Mediterranean Campaign in Anzio, Salerno and Sicily. Because of the vital cargo they carried, every LST was a prize target for U-boats and E-boats and the enemy land-batteries.

After September 1944 Stan, his crew and their LST were released from active service in Normandy and embarked for action in the Far East. In December 1944 Stan's LST was loaded with some much smaller Landing Craft Tanks on the upper deck, and other supplies on the lower deck, and they headed for India. They reached Calcutta in early 1945 where they started transporting troops and equipment from various ports in India to the shores of Burma. The return journey took a few days. Stan recalls hearing about VE Day whilst travelling somewhere in the Indian Ocean where, after a guick celebratory toast with his crew mates. they just continued their work as the war in the East was not vet complete. In September 1945, 2 days before his 20th birthday Stan was in Singapore where he witnessed the official surrender of Japan to Rear Admiral Louis Mountbatten.

Shortly after Singapore, the stern of

their LST was blown-in by an acoustic mine, so the crew were redeployed to a minesweeper. Stan spent most of 1946 minesweeping around Borneo before he was discharged in 1947. Alongside various Campaign medals Stan was also awarded a Burma Star for his service in the Far East. And the Normandy Brooch, and the Chevalier de l'Ordre National de la Légion d'Honneur for his service in Europe. These commendations have resulted in Stan and his comrades having the 'Honorary Freedom of the City of Southampton' which entitles them to "March through the streets of Southampton during ceremonial occasions with swords drawn, bayonets fixed, and drums beating, bands playing and colours flying".

After leaving the Royal Navy Stan Married Gwen in 1951 and they moved to Bitterne, where they raised three sons. Stan started working at Thorneycroft in Woolston as an electrical draughtsman. He changed jobs several times but was always involved with electrical work. He retired in 1989, and Stan and Gwen moved back to Netley in 1994. Stan is an active member of the Hound Local History Society.





### **HAMBLE LADIES GROUP**

It has been a while since I posted anything in the magazine so here is an update of what we have been up to over the last three months.

In February, Peter Ashburn, a local man, came along to tell us about his interest in Orchids, both wild and cultivated. His talk concentrated mainly on wild orchids and he showed us a wonderful slide show of orchids found in and around Hampshire. Noar Hill in Hampshire is what they call an 'Orchid Hotspot' and well worth a visit as there are 12 or 13 different species in this area alone.

Apparently 1 in 4 of all flowers in the world is a orchid. An interesting piece of trivia. The close ups of some of the orchids showed some very exotic, weird and wonderful flowers with many of them mimicking bees, wasps and flies. This attracts the insects which bring pollen with it.

He also showed us orchids from Hampshire, Kent and Dorset, Ireland and the North of England. There is an orchid in Dorset called the Sawfly which is a Mediterranean plant and experts cannot work out how it has managed to find its way to a quarry there.

This was a very interesting evening and the group thoroughly enjoyed the talk.

In March, Bug Wrightson came along from the Hampshire Search and Rescue Team together with his beautiful Springer Spaniel Oppo and gave us a very interesting talk explaining what they do, why they do it and why they use dogs.

What they do - they search for vulnerable and missing people throughout Hampshire, Dorest and Kent and they have 3 top operational dogs at the highest level; of which there are only 14 in the whole of the country. They have 9 support people who do everything the dog doesn't do. These people also help with training the dogs. There are 20 in the whole team who are all volunteers and Bug explained that they

had 95 calls in the last year spread over the South Coast. They train twice a week. There is no government funding and they raise their own funds through collections, applying for grants and donations. They received a grant from Test Valley Borough Council to provide an Instant Support Vehicle with all the equipment needed and at the moment they need to raise another £7,000 to buy this.

They use dogs because of their noses, of course, which are absolutely fantastic and can search for a vast range of things. A dogs sense of smell is amazing - 10,000 to 100,000 times better than us . In addition, they have 4 legs and great stamina which enables them to run around all day long.

Bug told us how much he loved volunteering and working with Oppo who was a family dog but after having him for 2 years decided to join Search and Rescue. The whole process of training takes about 18 months and only 10% of people and dogs who start get through. It is a very big commitment but such a worthwhile thing to do.

We certainly got the impression that Bug and Oppo enjoyed their volunteering and should be congratulated for what they do.

Unfortunately, due to circumstances out of our control, we had to cancel our meeting in April but we are hoping that Debbie Phillips will come along to our social evening in June to give us a demonstration of her Creative Paper Skills.

On 14th May Sgt Antony Waghorn visited us to talk to us about the very emotive subject of missing, abducted and exploited children.

He started by telling us that he joined the police force 18 years ago and was stationed at Shirley where he eventually became one of the drivers of the Blues and Twos which he absolutely loved. After doing that for 13 years he transferred to the Missing and Exploited Children team which, although

very stressful, he also loved.

He explained that from past experiences and mistakes made by the police force over the years they have learnt a lot about dealing with the terrible problem and are making headway in getting results and putting perpetrators behind bars.

He gave us a few examples of what some children have gone through and you can understand how stressful it can be dealing with this day in and day out.

The internet has a lot to blame for children becoming involved in this terrible crime. He couldn't stress enough how important it is to monitor what children are doing on the internet which can be quite a difficult to do as children can be very clever at keeping things from parents and grandparents. They can get drawn into all sorts of horrible things and get groomed by very clever people. As mentioned before, a very emotive subject but it was good to hear that progress in tackling the problem is very positive.

Missing children was another subject he covered, telling that this was also a terrible problem they deal with. If a child goes missing 3 times in 90 days then there is good reason for this and are possibly being groomed and exploited. Trafficking

of children is another problem involving children under 17 coming into the UK from war torn countries and these are extremely vulnerable and desperate people who are used for all sorts of exploitation which can be anything from sexual, working without pay, forced marriages, home slavery, working in nail bars or car washes for pittance but because they are so desperate to stay in the UK they just do as they are told and suffer at the hands of ruthless people.

Antony's talk was extremely thought provoking and it is sad to know that there are children being treated so appallingly.

11th June, as mentioned above, is our Social Evening. A relaxing get together to chat and catch up with strawberries and cream and a little fizz if you are lucky and Debbie Phillips with her Creative Paper demonstration.

And then we are already into July and we are off to Highclere Castle for our annual outing. We have a few seats left for this trip so if you interested give me a call on 02380 453626.
