Council News

The Parish Council held an unscheduled meeting over the summer recess to consider some planning applications. A number of parishioners attended to object to a planning application to demolish Creek Cottage in Satchell Lane and replace it with 4 dwellings. The parishioners' concerns included access on a dangerous bend in the road, the design and over development, plus loss of trees and possibility of flooding. The Council agreed to object to the application. The other significant planning application was to demolish the only remaining original Crowsport bungalow and replace it with a 5 bedroom, two storey dwelling.

Over the summer recess representatives of the Parish Council have met with Keith House - our County Councillor and Leader of the Borough Council - regarding a number of local issues including parishioners' concerns about problems with Hamble Lane. Subsequently they met with County Councillor Rob Humby

who is responsible for Environment and Transport to discuss matters regarding Hamble Lane. There was also a meeting arranged by the MP's office and hosted at GE Aviation to enable local councillors and businesses to receive a briefing on issues relating to highway matters.

In the next few months Highways England will be holding a consultation regarding junctions on the M27 including improvements to junction 8 and the Windhover roundabout. Look out for these consultations and make your views known.

It is pleasing to report that the planning appeal, at which the Parish Council made representations, against refusal for 80 homes at Mallards Road has been dismissed.

Thank you to everyone who participated in the WeRHamble consultation to give your views of what you value in Hamble and what improvements you would like to see in the future. The main findings were that

you value Hamble highly for its village feel and wish to retain this. The waterfront was of utmost importance to residents and visitors. Environmental considerations and the desire for sustainability were highlighted by parishioners as important. More details of the findings are reported on pages 14 & 15 and on the Parish Council website.

The Parish Council has identified a number of themes in the survey which it plans to take forward and it has decided to work with the Borough Council to find the best mechanism to secure residents wishes in relation to the Local Plan. Initially it will use the survey to update/replace the current Parish Plan which could include a Village Design Statement, while leaving open the option of a Neighbourhood Plan.

A parishioner attended a Public Session at a recent Council meeting to ask that the Parish Council retains the telephone box in the Village Square and suggested that it could be used to house a defibrillator. Redundant telephone boxes can be adopted for £1 from BT.

Over the recess the Council has been undertaking an extensive Health and Safety audit and has started to address some issues that have been identified. It has also adopted a new Code of Conduct for Councillors and details of this can be found on the Council's website including a breach of the code of conduct complaint form.

Finally, the Parish Council has agreed for a small Italian Market to be held on the Foreshore on Saturday 7th October, details of which can be found opposite. It has also been agreed to continue with the summer opening hours for the Parish Office. It will be open Monday and Friday 9am – 12.30pm and 1.30pm - 5pm. At other times during the week a visit can be arranged by appointment.

Local Band Set to Rock Southampton's Music in the City

Local Hamble Blues/Rock band "The Burns Unit" has been booked as closing act at Southampton's Music in the City - a project set up by a small group of people who want to make more of the music in Southampton.

The Burns Unit is actually playing twice - once as last act in the late afternoon at a newly refurbished venue called "Liberty's"; and finally on the main stage in the evening to close the event.

Music in the City is on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th October at various venues across Southampton City.

Liberty's is at 50, High Street. The main stage is at Westquay South, and The Burns

Message from the Clerk

I hope everyone has had a good summer. It's a shame that the weather hasn't been altogether reliable but it doesn't seem to have stopped people getting out and about, especially around the waterfront. Crabbing continues to be an enduring occupation for all ages and remains a focus for those coming to the village. Long may that continue!

We are expecting a busy few months with a number of consultations taking place. Eastleigh Borough Council will be formally consulting on their emerging Local Plan. The Parish Council are in discussion with them about how to reflect the outcomes of the Hamble consultation exercise in the Plan ensuring that sufficient weight is attached to local concerns when planning applications are considered in the future. We will keep you posted. In addition Highways England should have started an information event on M27 Junction 8 and Windhover roundabout (which also includes the A3024 Bursledon Road corridor and Northam Bridge) from the 9th September. We will make sure that the Council makes comments on the consultations and hope that residents will use the opportunity to make their concerns known in person.

In the last edition we were asking for volunteers to get involved with the new community library. I'm delighted to say that we had a good response and hope to be getting in touch with people as soon as we get closer to the buildings' opening.

The process has highlighted that a body of keen volunteers are available and are interested in wider volunteering options. If you represent a local group and you need volunteers then get in touch and we'll see

what we can do to match people.

At our last Council meeting, Councillors debated the annual issuing of the parking permits for the Foreshore Car Park. Each year we make 264 permits available. One permit is available to each household on the electoral register and allows up to 4 hours free parking each day. For 2018 the cost of the permit will be £8.00.

This year we have decided on a change to the process. The permits will only be available during December. This means that people will have the benefit of the permit for the whole year. To make life easier we will be able to take card payments or let people pay for them online. If you want a permit posting out, we will make an additional charge to cover postage. Unfortunately we won't issue permits in the New Year so it is important that people make a note of the change and either pop in and see us or email us with the request.

In the Council news there was an update on our new opening hours. We will be open Monday and Fridays each week. We will be open from 9am through to 5pm with an hour for lunch between 12.30 – 1.30pm. On the second and fourth Monday of each month, when we hold our Council meetings, the office will stay open an extra hour till 6pm which we hope will be helpful for people who work and cannot ordinarily get in to see us during the day. We also will see people by appointment during other times emails, texts and phone messages will be dealt with each day. Our new mobile phone number is 07402 648 050.

HAMBLE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERS



The autumn signals a return to one of our more demanding yet essential tasks, scrub clearance. Most of you will be aware that Hamble Common is not a natural environment but one that over millennia has been formed by human intervention whether it be grazing by domestic animals, cropping or fire. Deliberate fire clearance is obviously out of question these days and sadly this year there has been no assistance from cattle grazing. Those familiar with the Common must have noticed the lack of grazing, with vegetation on the Common unusually high.

The major task for October is to make a start on our annual scrub clearance of Hamble Common. We use a number of techniques and a recent innovation has been the introduction of Canadian Pullerbears which are, in essence, long handled

levers with jaws which make it possible to remove saplings from the ground with their roots intact, whereas cutting saplings just encourages regrowth. This year we have purchased two additional Cub sized Pullerbears that are better suited to removing small saplings and can be used by most volunteers and not just those with above average strength.

Please remember that there has been a major change to the day on which we carry out our tasks. Beach cleans and monthly tasks are on Wednesdays which are better suited to the majority of regular volunteers.

Our Social Evening was full of fun with a spread of bread, biscuits and cheese and some wine and a few games of beetle drive, once we had all remembered how to play it, and as usual, lots of chatting from our members.

In July we had a trip to Jane Austen House at Chawton and we were so lucky to pick a sunny day and able to eat our picnic lunches in the actual garden. After lunch we then went to the Lavender Fields at Alton where we were given an insight in the way they produce the lavender. We enjoyed a walk round the Lavender Fields and then sat down for a very welcome cream tea which was a good ending to a very enjoyable day.

In August we had a volunteer from the

Ellen McArthur Cancer Trust come along to tell us about what the trust does to help rebuild young people's confidence. Initially, the young people recovering from cancer are offered a four-day trip and this can make an immediate difference but long term counts. Many of the children who take this first trip want to do other trips and many of them were interested in returning to volunteer. The big differences over time were social success, education, reconsidering approach to life, family, employment and skills.

WeRHamble COMMUNITY CONSULTATION FEEDBACK

During June and July 2017, Hamble Parish Council undertook a survey seeking the responses of residents, and visitors to Hamble. In total, 422 people responded to the survey. Not all questions were answered. Although the survey data gives percentages, actual numbers are shown (in brackets) in order to gauge the extent of feeling on key issues.

More women than men replied to the survey with the largest age group being the 45-54 (95) year olds, closely followed by the 55-64 (81) and 35-44 (79) age groups. The lowest age group response was the 19 – 24 group with only 8 responses.

The majority of respondents were British (369) and were healthy without long term illness or health problems (330).

Responses from those with the longest residency (16 years +) were nearly double those who have lived here for less than 5.


Some strong themes developed around what people liked most about Hamble, living by the water was the clear favourite

followed by (in order) the variety of pubs, cafés and restaurants; village life; wildlife; and open spaces as well as peoples own home. This points to a community that enjoys the outdoors and the unique facilities on its doorstep.

When asked about aspirations for the future a large majority of people wanted to maintain the sense of village life (241) which was perceived to be friendly and safe. Environmental concerns also highlighted the desire to improve recycling facilities (250) with a general interest in alternative energy sources too.

Although people were happy with life in the village, getting in and out of it is highlighted as a problem with strong concern expressed about the need to tackle congestion (338), access in and out of the village (305) and emissions (157) / air quality (259).

When asked about facilities more generally, people felt there was a need for better access to public services (223) a range of shops (183) and parking to access local



shops (170). In addition, people valued play spaces (154), events for children and young people (149) and wanted to see improved employment/training for young people (116) in the village. Older people wanted more opportunities to meet (120) and for care and caring services to be prioritised (92).


Hamble came out as the single largest employment centre (114) although the largest group of people travelled to a wide range of destinations for work. These will be further anaylsed. For those looking for work, the need for flexible working (180) came out top which might well reflect problems of congestion on Hamble Lane. Improved mobile signal and broadband was also an important issue (127). Perhaps not surprisingly, most people (245) use their car for work whilst other forms of transport are less widely used.

227 respondents stated that they visit the water front most weeks, with as many as 145 visiting it every day. People visit for a variety of reasons but walking (348) and visits to pubs and restaurants are popular with many (318). 73% felt that we should promote tourism in Hamble with boat trips (241) being seen as a way of attracting more visitors.

Hamble Common is the most popular open space with 258 using it, followed by the Airfield (204). People felt that more litter bins (198), walking and cycling routes (180) and measures to promote wildlife would improve their experience.

This is just a snap shot of the results. Much more is available on our website including the results from the visitor survey. We are also collating the comments people made which gives greater insight into life in Hamble. We will be feeding back more information over the coming months and where people identified that they wanted to get involved we are hoping to do this also.






% of respondents that said each of the items listed are most important for:



HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Snowy White (4151), the Mercury Old Boys' Association archivist and magazine editor gave a very interesting talk to a full house of the Society about Hamble's Training Ship, TS Mercury. In 1952 at the age of 13 he joined the TS Mercury at Hamble and 4151 was his Mercury Boy number. Mercury Boys would often be called by this rather than by their name.

Training Ship Mercury was founded in 1885 as a charitable venture by a rich London banker benefactor. Charles Hoare. as a nautical training school for "poor but honest working-class boys to receive training for life at sea". At this time, there were either fee-paying training ships for prospective officers or reformatory ships for juvenile delinquents. He bought a sailing barque 'Illovo' to train boys for the Royal and Merchant navies. She was kept as a sea-going ship based at Binstead on the Isle of Wight and in 1888/89 made a voyage to the Mediterranean. In the early years most of the cadets were poor London boys and some were as young as nine.

In 1892 'Illovo' was permanently moored on the Hamble River where gradually a shore establishment was built in Satchell Lane. These buildings included classrooms, a theatre, band room and a chapel which was dedicated to St. Agatha. Throughout its history the boys slept on the training ship in hammocks, not ashore. Charles Hoare had caused a scandal by having an affair with a girl aged 15, Beatrice Holme Sumner and, as his mistress, had two of his children.

Charles Hoare shared a common interest in cricket with the famous scholar and sportsman, C B Fry, and when he died in 1908 C B Fry took charge of TS Mercury. He was mostly a figurehead and the school was run by his wife Beatrice known by the boys as 'Ma' Fry. He had married Beatrice ten years earlier who was the girl who

had been Charles Hoare's mistress. Mrs Fry 'ruled with a rod of iron' and the boys endured a tough regime to prepare them for a career at sea but they also enjoyed sporting and other activities.

Little money was left to run the training ship so C B Fry had to use his connections to raise funds for it to continue and it could no longer provide free education so had to take boys from the poor houses. By the First World War 'Illovo' was not big enough so was replaced by the 'President'. The training ships were accessed by a rowing boat via a pier. The original pier was further up river than the one built for the 'President' whose remains you can still see today. During the war, there were Admiralty Inspections and it received very good reports.

Between the wars a sailing tender 'Vishalla' was purchased to provide sailing experience. In 1930 there was a disastrous

fire and many of the buildings had to be rebuilt. Music was very important to Mercury life and the band took part in many local events. The band was led by Chief Officer 'Bandy' McGavin who is buried in Hamble churchyard.

During the Second World War many of TS Mercury officers, who had been in the reserve service, were recalled to sea. Previously most of the boys went to the Royal Navy but from this time many more of the boys joined the Merchant Navy.

In 1946 Mrs Fry died and this was not mourned by many Mercury boys and in 1950 C B Frv was persuaded to retire. This saw the end of the tough regime such as having to travel to and from the ship in bare feet and having to have a tally to go to the toilet. Subsequently Commander Bradby took over in 1950, followed by Commander Hoyle in 1960. After the war Inspectors of Education were critical of the education given at TS Mercury and it was clear more time had to be spent in the classroom. After a fire in 1954 a new classroom block was built and another fire in 1959 St Agatha's chapel was burnt down and eventually replaced.

By the mid 1960s Educational Authorities were not keen to send boys to TS Mercury to sleep aboard ship and it would be too expensive to provide ashore accommodation. There were also less boys

that wanted to go to sea, therefore, due to financial difficulties, it was forced to close in 1968 having prepared over 5,000 boys for life at sea.

In 1972 the training ship was towed away and an active Mercury Old Boys' Association (MOBA) formed and this helped it survive to be restored and it is today displayed at Chatham Dockyard under her original name 'HMS Gannet'. The MOBA having maintained close association with the village over the years, with an annual church service at St Andrew's Church and preserving many of its memorials - has now decided it is an appropriate time to disband.

Its records are being deposited at the Hampshire Record Office but it has a brilliant model of TS Mercury and the Mercury band's base drum for which it wishes to find a home in Hamble to maintain its connections with the village's residents. The MOBA is asking for suggestions for appropriate places for them to be displayed to be passed to the Society.

A number of Mercury Old Boys were present to share their memories of TS Mercury and many residents of the Mercury Area Residents' Association attended to find out more about the former establishment on which their homes were built. A very informative, worthwhile and enjoyable evening. (For more information and pictures see www.tsmercury.com)

50 YEARS AGO - Road Safety Satchell Lane

...The Headmaster was perturbed at nothing being done in view of the fact that the children cross the road 10,000 times a week in the course of their studies The Council agreed to take the matter up with the Highways Authority. OCTOBER 1967

Due to Hamble Secondary School having to develop on the north side of Satchell Lane it was a split campus.

25 YEARS AGO - Parish Meeting

...The public meeting had been called for parishioners to consider a planning application submitted by J.S. Bloor for construction of 5 dwellings on land east of School Lane, with the remaining part of Avery's (or Donkey Derby) Field being given to the Parish Council and the woodland and heather garden to Eastleigh Borough Council OCTOBER 1992
