UPDATE FROM THE CHAIR

Schools are back, many people have returned to their place of work, and life is taking on a hue of normality! Let's hope it continues. As things start to feel more normal, please don't forget to keep an eye on the public health messaging and keep up those simple steps such as hand hygiene to keep infections at bay!

At the start of September, we arranged the annual Farmers' Market on the Foreshore Car Park. As usual people flocked to it, had a great time, and feedback from the traders was positive. It's always a lovely event and each year the selection of produce gets better.

Over the summer we have also seen the monthly market start in Hamble and on alternate fortnights it visits Netley as well. As the market becomes more established, we hope to see more traders and more visitors. This isn't just about the stall holders but also about bringing people into the village heart to enjoy and support local businesses. As the winter months draw on, we hope this will help boost trade as we head towards Christmas.

We have also been successful in attracting more sports teams to the village this year with a record number of ten football teams visiting Mount Pleasant and the Roy Underdown Pavilion each week. This is a mix of youth and adult teams; some local, some from further afield. It's great to see so many people getting out and getting active. We are aware that there have been some problems such as pressure on parking and will be contacting all the users to encourage them to car share where they can. We hope to also highlight the other fantastic facilities available in the village that they could use while they are visiting - giving a further boost to local businesses.

Our partnership approach to managing anti-social behaviour over the summer has been successful, with favourable feedback from many residents and businesses. Not only has the Foreshore been awash with people having fun and enjoying the river, but generally nuisances such as drag racing, motorbikes and mopeds have reduced this year. All in all, the efforts of all parties have paid off and work is in place to start planning for next year. Thanks to everyone who reported issues to the Police, and please keep reporting incidents and concerns when they arise.

Finally, you will start to see a number of projects commence over the next few weeks. Large new commercial bins will be installed at the Foreshore which will help to deal with rubbish and waste with greater ease. Works to the surfacing of the Rail Trail has already taken place next to the allotments with more work planned on the Airfield side of Hamble Lane. The concrete benches at the Southern Quay should also be removed and new ones installed before Christmas completing this latest stage of improvements.

More news to follow next month on other changes including the review of the newsletter!

COUNCIL-LED COMMUNITY NEWS

COMMUNITY SAFETY & CRIME REDUCTION WORKING GROUP

While the ASB issue has not been completely eradicated, we have been buoyed by feedback from residents over the summer months, who have reported far fewer issues both at the Foreshore and throughout the village. In general, the feedback we have received is that Hamble has felt tangibly safer and happier over the summer.

We would like to take this opportunity to give our thanks to the Police team and the Harbour Master whose concerted efforts over the summer have made a very real difference to everyone throughout the community, as well as Eastleigh Borough Council and Youth Operations that work with us on youth engagement.

While we will continue to work in partnership with key partners, the current missing element to the arrangements is how we engage with the wider community. Councillor Palmer is a member of the Hampshire Police Independent Advisory Committee and the link to the Police and has proposed the establishment of a Community Safety and Crime Reduction Working Group to improve public confidence and help identify practical measures to stop crime. This proposal was agreed at the September Council meeting.

An initial priority for the Working Group will be to explore the development of Neighbourhood Watch schemes across the village, to work with the Police to develop a Business Watch scheme, and also with schools in relation to a Student Watch scheme.

It is anticipated that the first meeting will be held at the beginning of October, and the members of this Working Group are Councillors Cross, Dann, Nicholson and Palmer (Chair).

HAMPSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL GRANT BID

The Recycling and Sustainability Working Group has submitted a grant application to Hampshire County Council to fund the cost of installing water refill stations at various locations throughout the village, including the Foreshore.

We hope to receive feedback on our grant application in October.

INVESTMENT IN IT

The Council has agreed to invest in Microsoft Office 365 IT infrastructure to speed up and improve communication between staff and Councillors as well as facilitate better operational efficiencies. This new software will also offer residents more opportunities to engage and provide feedback on the activities of the Council, as well as providing more self-service options for the community.

UPDATE FROM THE ALLOTMENT WORKING GROUP

The allotment has seen a busy summer with a number of new improvements, including setting up an Allotment Working Group to improve future communication with allotment holders.

One of the matters under consideration by the Working Group is the pathway running through the allotments which is currently closed. This closure was initiated as a trial to reduce footfall through the area and to see how that impacted on vandalism and theft from the allotments.

We are currently consulting with allotment holders on how the closure has gone before making any permanent decisions. MEET THE COUNCILLOR – IAN UNDERDOWN



I have lived in Hamble all my life and am a retired teacher (Head of Technology). I am the longest serving current parish councillor with 27 years' service. Throughout that time, I have been an independent councillor and have held most positions on the council including being elected its chairman

five times. I am currently Chair of the Planning Committee.

When I joined the Parish Council in 1994, I was the youngest councillor and at that time council meetings were held at Mount Pleasant Pavilion. Today, council meetings are held in the Roy Underdown Pavilion at the College Sports fields that was not built at that time. A computer had just been introduced to the parish office to word process the minutes and council papers, whereas today meetings are held virtually and most communication is done online.

Hamble has significantly changed during my time on the Council with the loss of the village banks and the Harrier pub; the new doctors' health centre and Mercury Library and Community Hub; and new developments such as Lukes Close and Admiralty Row in the village square. As always, I will endeavour to do my best to continue to protect Hamble's village character and ensure its assets are passed on to the next generation to enjoy.

WORK AT ROY UNDERDOWN PAVILION PLANNED

Works have been agreed and scheduled to repair window and tile damage at RUP and to make improvements to the doors. It is hoped that, by improving the standard of the building, we can attract more users including young people and Youth Options. We want to welcome Hamble residents of all ages to RUP so that it becomes a well-used and much loved facility at the heart of the village which benefits the community as a whole.

The CCTV cameras and recording equipment have been upgraded and will provide image quality that will support prosecutions where crime is committed.

FORESHORE IMPROVEMENTS

Following a robust procurement exercise, the Council has approved the purchase of 16 Townscape heavy duty cast-iron Baltimore benches at the Foreshore over the winter period at an estimated cost of £32.9k. These replacement benches will significantly improve the outlook at the Foreshore and are part of a larger schedule of works designed to enhance the Hamble riverside, ensuring that it remains an attractive and desirable landmark for many years to come.

The CCTV at the Foreshore was improved earlier this year, with new camera equipment installed with better image capture. This is all part of the measures to help manage anti social behaviour and reduce the risk of crime.

Hamble Village Playschool was started by a group of parents in 2000 as a registered charity. We are a community-run pre-school for children

Hamble Primary School although our children may also go on to attend other schools in the area.

The pre-school is registered with OFSTED and we are proud of our "good" rating, which was reconfirmed in the latest OFSTED inspection at the start of 2018.

CAN YOU HELP TO CONSERVE HAMBLE COMMON?



With signs of autumn appearing, we can turn our attention to maintaining Hamble Common. As many of you will know already, Hamble Common is not a natural feature but the result

of thousands of years of human activity such as fire, grazing and peat removal. It is now sufficiently unusual to warrant the grant of Site of Scientific Interest (SSI) and requires a considerable amount of effort to preserve its historic condition.

With wildlife activity at a minimum, we have a window of opportunity to clear unwanted growth of shrubs and saplings. Given SSI restrictions on the use of heavy equipment, clearance can only be carried out with hand tools so we do need a high turnout of volunteers. The work can be physical, but there are roles for a wide range of strength and agility.

HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The Society recently held its first meeting for 19 months, reaching its 21st anniversary during this period of absence.

Society chairman, Ian Underdown, gave an illustrated talk on 'Hamble - Pictures from the Past', which was based on a

booklet published last year of the same title. Ian explained that most of Hamble's old pictures came from paintings or drawings prior to 1900, with postcards providing most images of the early 20th century. After the First World War ordinary people started to own cameras so they then had their own photographs.



Ian took the audience around the streets of Hamble starting at Hamble Lane and finishing at the foreshore. The presentation concluded with a variety of pictures showing different aspects Hamble's village life.

All the pictures shown in this talk are included in the booklet 'Hamble - Pictures from the Past' which is available from the Coronation Parade Post Office for £3.
