

#### FAMILY ACTIVITY DAY AT THE HAMBLE **PENINSULA TRAILS**

To mark the partial opening of the new trails around the Hamble Peninsula, Eastleigh Borough Council organised family activity sessions around the routes Hamble-le-Rice, Hound and Bursledon.

The sun came out on the first day of the Easter holidays as families were invited along to take part in some fun and educational activities to learn a bit about the nature and history of the local area.

Children were given mirrors to hold as they walked along the trail to experience how a squirrel or bird might view the area, they were also asked to find a stick that looked like it could be something else and search for 'treasure' on the beach.

Once they'd collected some of the treasure that had washed up on the shores, they attempted to make creations with plaster of paris, although the sea breeze made this difficult.

Some of the Parish posts, wayfinding markers and maps for the new Hamble Peninsula Trails are now ready for families to discover with more being installed in the coming weeks.

# SUPPORT WITH THE COST OF LIVING CRISIS: A GUIDE FROM THE CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

If you're struggling to make ends meet, here's what you need to know:

#### Help with school costs

If you're on a low income or claim Universal Credit, you might be able to get free school meals for your children. You can apply for free school meals on gov.uk. If you qualify, you might be able to get other help with school costs – and your child's school might get extra money. You might also be able to get help from your local 🔳 🚟 🔳 education authority with some costs such as uniforms, school activities and school transport. Visit https://bit.ly/3H05WVg



#### **Healthy Start vouchers and free vitamins**

If you're on a low income and you're at least 10 weeks pregnant or have a child under 4 years old, you might be able to get free vitamins and Healthy Start vouchers for milk, fruit and vegetables and infant formula milk. Ask your midwife or health visitor if you might be eligible. You could

#### Grants to help you pay off your energy debts

If you're in debt with your energy supplier, you might be able to get a grant to help pay off those debts. If your supplier doesn't offer grants, you might be able to get one from the British Gas Energy Trust: https://bit.ly/40r7Nce

#### Agreeing a payment plan with your energy supplier

If you're struggling to pay your energy bills you should tell your supplier that you want to pay through a payment plan, which will cover what you owe plus an amount for your current use. You'll pay fixed amounts over a set period of time, so you can pay what you can afford. Your supplier has to take into account how much you can afford and how much energy you'll use in the future.

#### **Help to Claim Universal Credit**

#### **Benefits calculator**

It's worth checking that you're getting all of the benefits that you're entitled to. Use a benefits calculator to check if there's anything else that you can get. You should also check with your local council to see if you can get a council tax reduction or discount.

#### Make a budget

If you want to make a budget, here are 3 steps.

- 1. Write down all your earnings after tax, any money from benefits or any other income you may receive
- 2. Write down all your outgoings. This includes existing debts, regular payments and other expenses
- 3. Use a budgeting tool to work out your budget: https://bit.ly/40oxZnW Before you start, have your bank statements or banking app to hand. You could also keep a spending diary to keep track of your spending ahead of completing a budget.



#### Check you're being paid the right wage

The minimum wage increased on 1 April 2023 so you should make sure that you're being paid the right amount.

- Aged 23 and over £10.42
- Aged 21 to 22 £10.18
- Aged 18 to 20 £7.49
- Under 18 £5.28
- An apprentice £5.28

#### Case study

A pension age client came to us for help maximising her income. She had tried in the past but with English not being her first language, found the application process challenging. We ran the figures and concluded that our client should be in receipt of Pension Credit.

We supported her to apply and get a 3 month backdate, improving her weekly budget by £177.10. We then discovered that she had in fact applied some time ago, but the application had stalled so we assisted her to challenge this. Our perseverance paid off, with the client being awarded a £10,000 back payment in addition to her weekly amount. The client was delighted!

#### **HELLO HAMBLE HABITANTS**

I recently went to a school reunion and for some reason somebody decided to invite a load of old people!

Hamble has a fascinating history that sometimes is in danger of being forgotten or literally lost to the sea. One such part of history is the Caddick Well.

This natural water source is located at Westfield Common and for hundreds of years it was used to supply vessels anchored offshore. Crews from a whole range of water vessels would fill their freshwater casks before heading off to sea and very likely numerous battles. This spring was made into a well, known as Caddick Well. It was once regarded as a 'holy well' and bottles of this water were sent far and wide for its holy or medicinal qualities. Caddick Well used to bear the inscription 'Let him that thirsted drink this water' on its surrounding stonework which was erected by the Yorke family. Unfortunately, the brickwork used to create the well has long since been eroded by the natural elements, although today at low tide, water from the spring can still be seen running across the beach.

Springtime is the season of new growth and every year bluebells transform woodlands across the country into a delicate sea of blue.

One of the nation's most loved wildflowers, the bluebell is also an indicator of ancient woodlands. The bluebell has held a treasured place in the hearts of British people for centuries. This delicate wildflower has played an influential role in folk culture too. Many myths surround the bluebell, although for such a heart-lifting flower the folklore is rather gloomy. There was a belief that bluebells were used in witches' potions. Others believed that anyone who wanders into a ring of bluebells will fall under fairy enchantment, or that anyone who hears the ringing of the flower's bell will be visited by a malicious fairy and die soon after.

- Almost half the world's bluebells are found in the UK they're relatively rare elsewhere.
- It is against the law to intentionally pick, uproot or destroy bluebells.

- Bluebells were not often used medicinally but legend
  has it that they were used by 13th-century monks to
  treat snakebites and leprosy something of a kill or
  cure remedy given that the bulb is poisonous.
- On the other hand, present-day researchers are looking into the bluebell's highly effective animal and insect repellent properties. There's even the possibility that certain bluebell extracts could be used to combat HIV and cancer.

If you'd like a bluebell walk in Hamble, check out Westfield Common, Heather Gardens or Woodpecker Walk.

#### **HELLO, I'M A DANDELION!**

A lot of people call me a weed but I'm a friend and come to help you!

My flowers are the first food for insects after hibernation and unlike most other plants, I have pollen AND nectar, not merely one OR the other! And I am generous with them!

#### HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

A Rare Hamble Letter

In June 1915, during the First World War, Basil Lubbock sent a letter from India where he was serving in the Army to Alf Dornom his skipper and chauffeur at Hamble.



He started by writing: "Dornom, I am writing this letter on birch bark as I have no writing paper being in camp 12,000ft above the sea with snow all round ......" He went on to say about his time in India and to ask about Alf's and other Hamble families, plus his concern regarding news of the village being spoilt by the flying people.

Basil Lubbock moved into Manor House in 1913 and was a writer of nautical books such as 'Round the Horn before the Mast' about his experience sailing on a four-masted barque. He was the first Commodore of Hamble River Sailing Club and he built and moved into Mere House in 1923.

Alf Dornom was skipper and chauffeur to some of the owners of the large houses in Hamble. He started his own boat business in the early 1930s operating from the foreshore and was the Cruising Association's Boatman for the area. Alf was one of the founder members of Hamble River Sailing Club and Captain of the Fire Brigade in the 1930s.

The letter was kept by his grandson, former ferryman Ray Sedgwick, which has now been given to Hampshire Record Office for safe storage and the public to see.

It said that it was of significant value on archival grounds, and they had nothing like it given it had been written on birch bark.

The next Society meeting will be on Thursday 8 June with a talk about 'Hamble Shops'.



# OUT IN THE FRESH AIR THIS SPRING? BE TICK AWARE!

With Spring upon us and many of us enjoying the sunshine and fresh air, make sure you stay 'tick aware', whether in urban and rural parks and gardens, or open countryside.

Ticks are tiny spider-like insects and are at their most active in Spring and Summer.

The best way to avoid being bitten by ticks when out walking is to keep to footpaths and avoid long grass. Other advice to people walking in areas known to have a high tick population is to:

- Wear appropriate clothing (a long-sleeve shirt and trousers tucked into your socks)
- Use an insect repellent
- Wear light coloured fabrics that may help you spot a tick on your clothes
- Inspect your skin for ticks regularly and at the end of the day, including your head, neck and skin folds (armpits, groin and waist)

- Check your children's head and neck areas, including their scalp
- Check that pets do not bring ticks into your home in their fur.

If you do get bitten by a tick, removing it quickly and correctly can help to reduce any potential risk.

The safe way to remove a tick is to use a pair of fine-tipped tweezers, or an easy-to-use device which can be purchased from pharmacies or vets. Then:

- Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull upwards slowly and firmly, as mouth parts left in the skin can cause a local infection
- Once removed, apply antiseptic to the bite area and keep an eye on it for several weeks for any changes

Contact your GP if you begin to feel unwell or develop a circular red skin rash, often described as a bull's-eye rash, and remember to tell them that you were bitten by a tick.

## **CORONATION FEATURE**

#### **CORONATION QUICHE RECIPE**



A deep quiche with a crisp, light pastry case and delicate flavours of Spinach, Broad Beans and fresh Tarragon. Eat hot or cold with a green salad and boiled new potatoes – perfect for a Coronation Big Lunch!

x1 20cm Flan Tin | Serves 6

#### Ingredients

#### **Pastry**

125g plain flourPinch of salt25g cold butter, diced25g lard

2 tablespoons milk

Or 1 x 250g block of ready-made shortcrust pastry

#### **Filling**

125ml milk

175ml double cream

2 medium eggs

1 tablespoon chopped fresh tarragon

Salt and pepper

100g grated cheddar cheese

180g cooked spinach, lightly chopped

60g cooked broad beans or soya beans

#### **Method**

- 1. To make the pastry...
  - A. Seve the flour and salt into a bowl; add the fats and rub the mixture together using your finger tips until you get a sandy, breadcrumb like texture.
  - B. Add the milk a little at a time and bring the ingredients together into a dough.
  - C. Cover and allow to rest in the fridge for 30-45 minutes
- 2. Lightly flour the work surface and roll out the pastry to a circle a little larger than the top of the tin and approximately 5mm thick.

- 3. Line the tin with the pastry, taking care not to have any holes or the mixture could leak. Cover and rest for a further 30 minutes in the fridge.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 190°C.
- 5. Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper, add baking beans and bake blind for 15 minutes, before removing the greaseproof paper and baking beans.
- 6. Reduce the oven temperature to 160°C.
- Beat together the milk, cream, eggs, herbs and seasoning.
- 8. Scatter 1/2 of the grated cheese in the blind-baked base, top with the chopped spinach and beans and herbs, then pour over the liquid mixture.
- 9. If required gently give the mixture a delicate stir to ensure the filling is evenly dispersed but be careful not to damage the pastry case.
- 10. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Place into the oven and bake for 20-25 minutes until set and lightly golden.


