The Hamble Airfield planning application continues to rumble along, and while there is a fuller update on progress within these pages, the bottom line is that the Regulatory Committee at which the application will be decided is now unlikely to happen before November at the earliest. This is because Hampshire County Council has asked Cemex to provide additional information which, once received, will be subject to public consultation. We continue to work alongside our consultants and the Hamble Peninsular Residents Group to achieve the very best outcome for the village.


Interesting times ahead.

HAMBLE AIRFIELD UPDATE: MORE INFORMATION REQUESTED FROM CEMEX

In August, Hampshire County Council (HCC) wrote to Cemex with a formal 'Regulation 25' request, compelling them to provide more information in relation to their quarrying proposals for Hamble Airfield. HCC asked Cemex to provide all details required by mid-September, although at the time of writing (20 September) no new documents have been uploaded onto HCC's planning portal.

The information required by HCC relates to the environmental impact of their proposals, specifically regarding ecology, restoration and aftercare, hydrology and flood risk, air quality, landscape and visual impact, soils, and air quality. You are view this letter here: bit.ly/3PLso9a

Once Cemex has responded to this Regulation 25 request, another formal public consultation will take place, and we will be given the opportunity to comment on the latest information provided by Cemex and how (if at all) it impacts upon the viability of the proposed development.

Only once this next public consultation is complete will the application progress to HCC's Regulatory Committee for a decision. It is highly unlikely that this will happen before November, although HCC is keen to conclude this process before the end of the year.

What Happens Next?

Hamble Parish Council will review the implications of the additional materials provided by Cemex in response to the Regulation 25 notice. We will also take advice from our planning consultants and work in collaboration with

Hamble Peninsular Residents Group (HPRG). We will update you further once we understand the potential implications of the new information submitted.

What Can You Do?

For now, the situation has not changed – although a further delay in setting a date for the Regulatory Committee decision is frustrating. Once we have had sight of the new information from Cemex, we will publish a summary of our consultants' recommendations which you can reference in any further representations you wish to make. Please continue to keep an eye on our social feeds and noticeboards for further updates.

CHECK YOUR CHIMNEY

Ahead of the Autumn and Winter seasons, now is the time to get your chimney swept, and the gas central heating appliances in your home checked by a registered engineer.

Hampshire & IOW Fire and Rescue Service has shared the following tips to help reduce the chances of a fire in your chimney.

- sweep the chimney before use if you haven't used it for some time
- ensure a fireguard is in front of the fire at all times
- sparkguards can prevent a serious property fire
- extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house
- never use petrol or paraffin to light your fire

CHRIS AYRES

As you may have read in our September newsletter, our long-serving estates team member Chris Ayres recently passed away following a long battle with illness. Chris dedicated 21 years to Hamble as a member of the Council team, retiring in March of this year, and will be missed by us all.

Born near Fair Oak, Chris lived in Hamble for a while with wife Sarah, before settling in Netley. In his youth, he was a very talented footballer, scouted by many top-tier teams, but for Southampton fan Chris, none of them could match the appeal of The Dell or St. Mary's. Some of Chris' happiest moments came when following the Saints to away games throughout the country.

Chris was a popular and sociable member of the community – and this was very evident at his funeral where it was standing room only. In Chris' memory, many people wore football shirts, and the service finished with a Rick Astley song – one of his favourites, we're told!

Chris joined the Parish Council team in 2002 and immediately started to make an impact on our community's spaces, assets, and amenities. One of Chris' frustrations was rewilding. While he completely understood the reasons why it was needed, he felt it looked messy and as if he had not done a proper job. Chris was nothing if not meticulous in his work!

Over the years, Chris' reputation in the village grew, and it was not unusual for him to get other residents knocking on his door with requests for jobs to be done. If you couldn't catch him at home, it was a fair bet that you'd find him at one of the local pubs after work.

One of our abiding memories of Chris will be of his work rate – which was prolific to say the least. He was a prodigious worker, putting to shame people half his age! A perfect example of this was the community orchard, where he worked solidly for two hours digging holes in which to plant the trees.

Chris was kind, funny, drank a litre of coke every day, and couldn't keep still. If you wanted to keep him in one place for any period of time, you needed to make sure that lunch was provided.

Some years ago, we completed Belbin tests to identify our strengths as team members. Chris' results couldn't



have been more accurate; he was defined as someone steady, solid, who would get on and do whatever was needed. Chris was all about supporting others; in our team, he was the gel that helped to keep us together. It was a privilege to work with Chris, and we'll miss him greatly.

NEED TO REPORT A LOCAL ISSUE?

While we will always attempt to help our residents with any problems reported to us, the statutory duties and related functions of Hamble Parish Council are limited. This means that some issues - such as dog fouling, street cleaning, potholes, and street lighting - are beyond our scope.

Additionally, you can use FixMyStreet - an independent website, built by the charity mySociety. This website (and app) makes it easier to report problems in your community, even if you don't know who those reports should go to. All you have to do is type in a postcode - or let the site locate you automatically - and describe your problem. Then your report is sent to the people whose job it is to fix it. WARM PACKS NOW AVAILABLE FROM CITIZENS ADVICE

Citizens Advice Eastleigh making warm packs available for those who need them this winter. With the cost of living crisis still hitting our community hard, these



warm packs are just one part of a support package offered to residents by CA which also includes:

- benefit checks to maximise income
- money management, from everything budgeting to bankruptcy
- housing issues including disrepair, eviction, arrears, homelessness
- employment matters
- relationship and family issues

KEEP AN OLDER PERSON SAFER 2023

Cold calling is not illegal. However, any trader that ignores a sticker or notice on a door stating that the occupier does not wish to receive cold calls may be committing a criminal offence.



Nationwide home care provider Live In is currently providing free door stickers to Parish Councils to give to older people to help keep them safe this winter. These are free of charge and can be collected from the Parish Office.



BURSLEDON BRICKWORKS HALLOWEEN AND AUTUMN STEAM UP

The local brickworks museum has an autumn steam up on Sunday 22 October during the upcoming half term. They



welcome the traction engines back from their summer show season to join in one last celebration of brickmaking before the museum closes for the winter months. As the nights darken and the season draws in, don't miss the chance to explore the genuinely haunted museum at Halloween.

There will be steam engines in the yard, a steam powered wood sawing demonstration, and steam hauled trailer rides around the site. The café will be open all day to warm anyone with a hot cuppa. There will also be craft stands inside the buildings, and a chance to take in the displays telling the story of local history.

Run by volunteers, Bursledon Brickworks is the UK's last steam-driven works of its kind, having been built in 1897 on the banks of the River Hamble.

I'm thinking of starting up a new business recycling discarded chewing gum... I just need some help getting it off the ground!

I expect many Hamble residents will have noticed an influx of spiders in their houses recently. This time of year is known as spider season. Larger spiders wandering around houses and gardens are typical for this time of year. For many species the autumn season is the time of year when they are mature and also when the females are full of eggs, making some spiders much larger.

House spiders may give you a shock when they suddenly appear in the corner of your eye as they race across your

carpet like the arachnid equivalent of Usain Bolt, but as with most of our spiders in the UK, they're basically harmless. HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY: THE LOCAL STORY OF THE SPITFIRE

At the Society's last meeting Stephen Hoadley gave a very interesting talk about the local area's important contribution to the Spitfire's wartime success.

The Schneider Trophy seaplane races held off Calshot led Reginald Mitchell to design the prototype Spitfire that first flew from Eastleigh Airport in 1936. He originally wanted to call it 'Shrew', but it was thought this was not a suitable name for a fighter aircraft and a company director suggested 'Spitfire' after the nickname of his daughter who had a fiery temper. Spitfires were first built at Supermarine's factory at Woolston that was bombed in 1940 so its production had to be dispersed.

At the beginning of the war Air Service Training (AST) at Hamble was appointed to undertake the repair of damaged or crashed



Spitfires and was the largest Spitfire repair base in the country. The women of the Air Transport Auxiliary based at the airfield greatly facilitated its success, ferrying the Spitfires to and from Hamble to their squadrons. Stephen spoke about some of the well-known ATA women at Hamble and that for the first time ever there was equal pay for women as all ATA pilots were paid the same rate.

Another Hamble company, Folland Aircraft, was a sub-contractor for Spitfire production and had major contracts to make Spitfire components including making wings for the Seafire (Naval version of the Spitfire). It developed a floatplane version of the Spitfire but not many were made as by the time they had been produced they were no longer required.

Stephen concluded by talking about what is left today to commemorate the local contribution to the Spitfire's success including the ATA memorial at the former airfield's entrance by Aquila Way. The large audience enjoyed Stephen's talk and there was much follow-up chat afterwards.

HAMBLE LADIES GROUP

We met again on 12 September and welcomed Susan Howe who came along to talk to us about the 'Revelations of a Tour Guide'. Susan began her talk explaining that she was a London Registered Blue Badge Guide, the only tour guides who can take guided tours anywhere in the UK. If you are only trained as, for example, a Winchester or Southampton Tour guide, you can only guide in those cities. The course to become a tour guide is very intensive and takes 2 years to complete.

Susan kept us amused for over an hour telling us about all the 'funny' things that had happened during her career which started in 1980, including how she had to stretch the truth at times to make a good story for the tourists. In her many years as a guide, she managed not to lose anyone – although there were a few near misses. She has guided throughout the UK as well as abroad touring with English groups. Susan captivated us with her tales, and we had a very enjoyable afternoon full of laughter.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 10 October when we have Simon Gardiner, a volunteer at Mercury Hub and Library, who is coming along to give us an insight into its history. We meet at 2pm in the Priory Centre, Hamble Church. Why not come along and join us? Everyone welcome.
