## WELCOME TO YOUR LATEST NEWSLETTER

With the turning back of the clocks and the onset of dark evenings and frosty mornings, it feels like winter is upon us all too soon. At a time when the world faces greater challenges and unrest than it has in many years, there is something comforting about walking along the Foreshore and looking out across the calming river on a crisp autumnal day. We are so very lucky to live in this little oasis that is Hamble.

That is not to say that we don't face challenges – both as a community and individuals. The colder weather brings higher heating bills and isolation to some of our neighbours. If you have concerns, please consider visiting Citizens Advice at the Mercury Hub on the first Wednesday morning of every month - their trained advisers can help you to find a way through many cost of living worries.

The Hamble Airfield quarrying application to which so many in the community are opposed continues with little prospect of resolution in the coming months. As you may recall from last month's update, Hampshire County Council (HCC) had asked Cemex to provide additional information relating to the environmental impact of their proposals which, once received, will be subject to public consultation. The deadline for providing this information was Our understanding is that Cemex's mid-September. response was received some weeks ago but has not yet been published on HCC's Planning Portal (at the time of writing). This delay means that it is unlikely that the Regulatory Committee meeting at which the application will be decided will take place this year, given that public consultation would need to take place first. The fear is that

HCC will go out to the public over the Christmas period, which will not provide the community with adequate opportunity to consider and respond to the new information supplied. We will continue to work with Hamble Peninsular Residents Group to lobby HCC to ensure that the circumstances under which this application is decided are fair to all and give us the best possible opportunity to make our case.

Alongside our Airfield 'watching brief', we have been busy preparing the Parish Council's budgets for next year, deciding how best to spend your precept on assets and services which will improve the village. While our hands are tied in some areas, we are always keen to hear your views on what you feel needs to be improved, replaced, or introduced. This is your community and your village please tell us what you'd like to see so that we can take this into consideration next year and in the years to come. Please email Helen our Clerk with your thoughts or ideas.

Finally, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Sarah Lehneis for her service to the Council. Sarah has resigned as Parish Councillor following three years of hard work and dedication to the village – particularly in her role on the Communications Working Group. Her energy and ideas played a big part in Hamble winning the Village of the Year Communications award in 2022.

## **FORESHORE CAR PARK PERMITS 2023**

Each year the Council sells permits for the Foreshore Car Park which allow permit-holders 4 hours of free parking, 365 days a year. 250 permits are available on a first come, first serve basis.



The annual parking permit charge for 2023 will be £25 – less than 7p per day. Any changes to the hourly parking charges in The Square will be in line with Eastleigh Borough Council's charges.

## RANGERS REMARKS

I was less than impressed during my most recent trip to the zoo where one of the exhibits was just a slice of toast in a cage... I believe it was bread in captivity!

With the return of the cooler wetter weather a lovely stroll through the woods, pastures or parks of Hamble will have an added bonus with the annual emergence of a huge variety of fungi.

Fungi are one of the most diverse organisms on Earth and contribute to many aspects of life as we know it. They're the most populous kingdom on the planet – an estimated 3.8million fungi exist worldwide – and yet, more than 90% of them are currently unknown to science.

Strange as it sounds, some mushrooms are bioluminescent. They achieve this thanks to luciferins, the same compounds that make fireflies light up at night and some sea creature's glow. This surprising skill – known as foxfire – is used to attract insects. They then spread the mushroom spores elsewhere in the forest, allowing the fungi to reproduce. In the future, the natural phenomenon of bioluminescence could be used to genetically engineer luminescent trees as a – quite literally – green alternative to streetlights.

A fungus is neither plant nor animal and belongs to its own 'fungi kingdom'. But, genetically speaking, they're more closely related to animals than plants. Like us, they 'breathe in' oxygen and give out CO2. Unlike plants, they don't need sunlight to reproduce. Instead, they rely on other organisms for food – just like animals. Also, their cell walls contain chitin, which is found in the exoskeletons of insects, the shells of crustaceans, and the beaks of octopuses.

Sure, we've a lot less in common with a toadstool than a chimp. But next time you're tucking into mushrooms and thinking about how meaty they taste, don't be too surprised. They're closer to animal life than most people think.

And finally, a random, interesting, and useful fact for you. Sharks will only attack you if you're wet.

## **COVID RECOVERY FUND**

Eastleigh Borough Council has recently launched the Eastleigh Covid-19 Community Recovery Grant that gives local community groups and organisations the chance to apply for funding to help local people who are still recovering from the mental and physical effects of Covid.

The Borough-wide scheme offers grants of up to £10,000 and priority will be given to groups that support:

- activities that support the health and wellbeing of vulnerable people and those who were shielding and/or self-isolating
- organisations that support individuals experiencing hardship caused by the pandemic
- organisations that support mental health, bereavement and emotional needs arising from the pandemic
- mental and physical health support for young people and adults including mobility, long Covid.

## **COUNCILLOR VACANCY**

## Who can apply?

The fund is open to any non-profit making community groups, voluntary organisations, trusts, friendly societies, social enterprises, and community interest companies in the borough. They can provide a service directly, offer advice/information or promote self-help and must have a wide community benefit and be open to anyone.

Applications can be made until 1 March 2024 or until the grant funding is fully allocated, whichever comes first.

# INTRODUCING YOUTH OPTIONS

Youth Options is a Hampshire based charity supporting children and young people for a better future, no matter their life circumstances. They offer bespoke, targeted support, as well as open-access community (detached) and centre-based youth provisions across the Eastleigh borough.

The Youth Options team has delivered detached youth work in Bursledon, Hamble, and Hound since April 2018 with funding from the local Parishes and Eastleigh Borough Council. They are focused on building relationships with local police, shops, organisations, residents and, most importantly, young people.

During these sessions, the Youth Options team of Youth Support Workers supports young people to develop social and emotional skills, as well as increase their understanding of and ability to address issues. They visit hotspot areas where they know that young people are likely to be, working with them to engage in positive activity, seeking any advice they may need, and supporting the community to feel safer.

Easily recognisable in their blue uniform, the team is out in the community on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays between 5.30pm – 9.30pm.

## **HAMBLE LADIES GROUP**

For our October meeting, Simon Gardiner, a volunteer at the Mercury Hub and Community Library, came along to give us a very interesting talk about the setting up, running and growth of the Hub's popularity. With slides of the facilities, displays and events, Simon explained how the Hub was started in 2019 by keen volunteers, interrupted by lockdowns, and has grown since a restart in late 2020.

Thanks to over 30 volunteers, the library offers not only 3,500 books but also a social space, refreshments, wifi and many activities including arts, crafts, book club, knit and natter, quilling and a host of board games and jigsaws, and storytelling for 800 registered users.

Supported by Eastleigh Borough Council and voluntary donations, the Mercury Hub is reaching across the

community and caters for all age groups. Simon pointed out the rise in community libraries nationally, each resourced and managed according to local circumstances. Now open every day except Sundays the Hub is attracting visitors from Hamble and beyond. Coffee mornings have been held to raise money for the Hound Food Bank, Hamble Lifeboat, Air Ambulance, and Countess Mountbatten to name just a few.

Simon gave his talk to another full house with over 50 ladies in attendance.

# HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY: OLD NEWSPAPER REPORTS OF HAMBLE



At the next Society's meeting its Chairman, Ian Underdown, will be giving a talk about many fascinating 'Old Newspaper Reports of Hamble'. Why not come along to hear the amazing reports about Hamble, such as smuggling, privateers taking its boats, a shooting at the Victory Inn, and the local policeman solving a major crime at the Manor Hotel that led to the longest fraud trial in British history.

Others include a farm arsonist execution, fishermen's deaths, the first woman's seaplane flight, and notable village events such as a bull fight on the Quay and novelty events at regattas.

An accompanying booklet has been produced that includes newspaper reports from the 1700s and each decade of the next two centuries. It will be first available at this talk at the cost of only £4. After this you will be able to buy one from the Post Office at Coronation Parade. This booklet is a must read for anyone interested in Hamble and the river with astonishing and remarkable descriptions of happenings involving it over the years.

# BIRD AWARE SOLENT'S SPECIES SPOTLIGHT: BLACK-TAILED GODWIT

Autumn is upon us, and it's an extremely exciting time of year in nature's calendar as thousands of migratory coastal birds arrive on the Solent for the winter. Among them are black-tailed godwits, elegant wading birds that travel over 1,000 miles from Iceland to get to our local shores every winter – an extraordinary journey for a bird weighing less than 300g.

In the winter, their plumage is greyish-brown and far less vibrant than their summer season orangey brown plumage. They have long beaks and legs, and black and white stripes on their wings. Female black-tailed godwits are bigger than their male counterparts, with a slightly longer beak – perhaps to help them avoid competing with each other for food.



Their scientific name – limosa limosa – actually translates from Latin as 'muddy muddy', and at low tide they like to feed in groups with other

black-tailed godwits – you will see them stabbing their bills up and down in the wet mud like the needles on a sewing machine.

The end of godwit's bill is flexible to help them feel around for tasty worms. At high tide they roost together in big groups: they are particularly keen on saltmarsh and shingle islands as they feel safe and well away from any predators.

## HAMBLE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERS

We are very pleased with the volunteer turnout this autumn which has enabled us to tackle some major tasks for Hamble Parish and Eastleigh Borough Councils.

Those who walk regularly on Hamble Common will have noticed that we are making significant inroads into the bracken and general scrub that tends to overwhelm everything else. Most of you will be aware that a Common is not a natural feature and would become overgrown if left unattended. Hopefully a combination of our efforts along with grazing cows will keep this rare historic feature accessible to people and wildlife.



Our annual programme of tasks is displayed on our website and notice boards posted around the Common. Please note that the meeting place for the Parish tasks is at the Roy Underdown Pavilion at SO31 4RN whereas Beach cleans and Eastleigh tasks meet at the School Lane car park.

## **KEEP PETS CALM THIS BONFIRE NIGHT**

Many animals find fireworks very worrying. Owners will often see their pets struggling, either frozen with fear or, in the most dangerous circumstances – bolting, rearing up or charging fences.

In situations like these, it's hard to know how to react or what to do. This is particularly true if you're a new pet parent.

However, if you're one of the 69% of UK adults taking measures to help relax or prepare your pets, horses and livestock for firework season, here are some helpful hints and tips from the RSPCA that will help.

## **Keeping Dogs Calm:**

- Walk your dog during daylight hours to avoid times when fireworks are likely to be set off.
- Move your dog to a 'safe
  haven' each evening before the fireworks begin.
   Provide toys and other things that they enjoy in the safe haven.
- Make sure there are things for you to do too, so your dog isn't left alone.
- Close windows and curtains to muffle the sound of fireworks. Blackout your doggy safe haven, so they can't see any flashes outside.
- Put on some music or TV to mask the firework sounds.
- Ignore the firework noises yourself. Play with a toy to see if your dog wants to join in, but don't force them to play.

## **Keeping Cats Calm:**

- Provide hiding places in your home, such as under furniture or a quiet corner.
- Don't stress your cat by trying to tempt them out.
   Leave them until they're ready.
- Keep them indoors to avoid them becoming stressed.
- Microchip your cats in case they're startled and escape outside.

## **Keeping Small Animals Calm:**

- Partly cover outside cages and pens with blankets so it's soundproofed and hidden, leaving an area for animals to look out.
- Provide bedding for small animals to burrow in.
- Consider bringing them indoors this will need to be done gradually, so plan ahead.






# How you can help reduce the impact of fireworks on animals

If you want to enjoy fireworks, you can make them less frightening for animals in the following ways:

- Going to an organised event will reduce the number of fireworks disturbing animals.
- Look for low-noise fireworks, and let your neighbours know well in advance so animals including horses and livestock, can be prepared.
- Never set off fireworks near livestock, as frightened animals – especially horses – can injure themselves when frightened.
- Fireworks can also disturb wildlife so steer clear of known habitats like lakes with waterfowl and trees with roosting birds.
- Check bonfires for wildlife before lighting as animals like hedgehogs may be hibernating.

## WHAT TO DO WITH YOUR PUMPKINS AFTER HALLOWEEN

Reduce food waste and help wildlife with these eco-friendly ideas to make the most of your pumpkin.

#### Eat the seeds

After removing the seeds from your pumpkin, rinse them, drizzle with oil and season with your favourite spices, then roast for a healthy snack or a crunchy topping for soups and salads.

## Cook the pieces of pumpkin you carve out

All those triangles we cut out of our pumpkins to give them their scary faces can be saved and added to your dinner. Just place any scraps of pumpkin into a bowl in your fridge, then season and roast them. Add to pasta, risotto, stir-fry, or whatever you're having for dinner!

## Compost your pumpkin

Turn your leftover pumpkin into nutrient rich compost. Make sure you chop up the pumpkin before adding it to your compost bin, to help it break down.

## Make a pumpkin bird feeder

Cut the top off your pumpkin, turning it into a bowl, then add bird seed. Hang with twine and enjoy watching the birds. Compost the remaining pumpkin afterwards.

## **Bury your pumpkin**

You can bury your pumpkin directly in the soil to break down and provide nutrients for your garden. Cutting the pumpkin up first will help it to break down faster. Make sure you have removed the seeds before burying, or you may end up with your own pumpkin patch next autumn!

## What not to do with your leftover pumpkin

Please don't leave your pumpkins in woodland or other local green spaces. Although some wildlife may enjoy eating pumpkin, it can make other animals very sick and could also spread disease.

Leaving your pumpkin in the street or in your garden until it rots will attract pests. As soon as your pumpkin starts to rot you must dispose of it properly.
