WELCOME TO YOUR LATEST NEWSLETTER!



Here we are in December, and it is difficult to believe that we are already in touching distance of the end of another year. And what a year it has been!

The Hamble Airfield application continues to rumble along, with the latest (third) public consultation now underway, giving residents and statutory consultees (like Hamble Parish Council) until 15 December to respond. There's more information about this on page 2 of this newsletter, but the bottom line is that, if you don't want to see a quarry in the middle of Hamble, you MUST write to Hampshire County Council now to tell them. Please don't leave it to someone else - the village's best chance of getting the Regulatory Committee to consider our objections is through volume of response.

Onto more positive matters, and I was thrilled to see some of the community events planned for Hamble over Christmas. It's a great testament to our village that we have so many residents who are willing to come together to create something special for the rest of the community to enjoy. One such example is the Christmas Eve Carols in Hamble Square, organised so well by David de Kretser for many years, with the mantle now passed to a new team of The Hamble Advent Calendar is another wonderful Hamble Christmas tradition, and while the advent calendar itself is not taking place this year, the organisers have arranged a Christmas Trail instead. While many of us are lucky enough to have a Christmas to look forward to, this is not the case for everyone in our

community. If you're in a position to do so, please do what you can to share goodwill with neighbours, by donating to Hound Basics Food Bank (drop off points include St. Andrew's Church, the Co-op on Coronation Parade, and Follands Sports & Social Club), or supporting one of the many charity events that are taking place in Hamble throughout December. We've included details of one or two in our Upcoming Dates (page 12).

If you need support this winter, please consider visiting one of the Citizens Advice 'Drop In' sessions at the Mercury Hub on the first Wednesday of every month, between 10am and midday. They offer such a brilliant service – far more than just the advice for which they are known. For example, they are currently offering fuel vouchers up to £147 for those in fuel poverty; they can help you to see if there are any benefits or grants that you can get to help pay energy bills; and they can provide you with a warm pack to help you minimise your heating costs.

Just a reminder that your next newsletter is due to be with you at the beginning of February, but if there are any significant updates on the Hamble Airfield application before then, we may well run a 'stop the presses' extra edition. In the meantime, I would like to wish you a very Merry Christmas, and let's hope that 2024 brings good health and happiness to us all.

UPDATE ON HAMBLE AIRFIELD APPLICATION



Quick recap on the Cemex application:

Back in August 2023, Hampshire County Council (HCC) asked Cemex to clarify several areas relating to their Hamble Airfield planning application under planning 'Regulation 25'. These areas included: soils, ecology, restoration, air quality, and flooding.

Now that this information has been received from Cemex, we are being given the chance to review and respond.

What's happened since the last newsletter?

Cemex has now provided answers to the environmental questions from HCC's Planning Authority. HCC has published all Cemex's new and revised 'technical' documents on their HCC planning portal (dated November 2023).

What do these new and revised documents say?

Steve Tilbury, HPC's planning consultant, has reviewed these new and revised documents from Cemex. He also attended the Full Council meeting on Monday 13 November 2023 to update the councillors and members of the public who joined us in person.

Steve's feedback was as follows:

- While Cemex has answered all of HCC's questions, there is very little new information in the documents updated/introduced. The responses are a mixture of rebuttal and additional information.
- Rebuttal responses assert that the consultee (i.e., the person or organisation questioning the information or assertions provided by Cemex) is incorrect or has misunderstood the submission. The response on noise impacts is one such example of this, with

- Cemex saying that Eastleigh Borough Council is seeking to apply incorrect standards/benchmarks.
- In other cases, such as the management of groundwater (flooding) or risk to the stability of the railway cutting, additional analysis has been carried out and submitted.
- Much of the new information is contained within the air quality (health) information and flood run-off documents - but there is very little here that sheds new light on the application.
- Due diligence is at the heart of this exercise HCC's request for further information was designed to ensure that they have something in writing from Cemex which covers off points raised by consultees. To this end, many of the questions asked by HCC were designed to fill gaps in Cemex's application; they did not cover areas of significance such as road safety.
- In terms of highways, HCC did not ask for further information, as the Highways officers have already received sufficient information to make a judgement on the application (in their opinion).

What happens next?

We now have until 15 December 2023 to provide feedback on the new/revised information provided by Cemex. Following this date, HCC's Planning Department will collate their report ready to present it to the Regulatory Committee. This is the Committee that will decide whether to approve or reject the application.

When will the decision be made?

- Given this timeline, we anticipate February 2024 to be the earliest date when the Regulatory Committee will meet to decide on this application.
- However, HCC's Planning team will confirm the actual Committee date in due course - we'll keep you posted.

What can you do?

Cemex's submission gives us another opportunity to lobby HCC - even if these new/amended documents haven't made significant changes to the application.

The most important point is to make our voices heard now and in the run up to the Regulatory Committee (RC)

meeting in early 2024. A large volume of responses from the community can make a difference to the Regulatory Committee's decision.

- Most importantly when you write to HCC, highlight how this quarry will affect you, and your family. For example: your mental and/or physical health, your ability to enjoy your home and garden, your ability to commute OR work from home, or the impact of travelling and getting around. You could also consider safety when walking, access to public transport etc.
- If you can, aim to make it different to any response you have submitted previously. For example, focus on a different area of the application – such as air quality or flooding – and how this might affect you personally.

The biggest impact that you can have on this application is by talking about your own lived experience – and how this quarry could impact the lives of you and your families for years to come.

In the meantime, please feel free to:

- Look out for more guidance from HPC and Hamble Peninsular Residents Group in the coming weeks.

We will continue to provide more information and updates as we learn more.

HAMBLE PENINSULAR RESIDENTS GROUP URGE YOU TO PUT PEN TO PAPER AGAIN

We know it feels like an endless task, which it is and always will be with Persimmon Homes as the landowner, but we need you to reiterate your concerns to Hampshire County Council (HCC) by 15 December.

It is absolutely vital that we get maximum responses again to highlight frustration. Anyone can write and show support for the village – your friends, family, team-mates, work colleagues.

The new information from Cemex is quite technical and complex in certain areas. We are working with the Parish Council and consultants to delve into the detail to counter what has been presented. However, this new information does not change the facts.

The proposal is still to put a quarry in the heart of the village. It is still within unacceptable proximity to schools, residential housing, and over 250 businesses. We have done a survey of all Cemex UK quarries, and none are remotely comparable. Therefore, they have zero experience of managing such development.

All your concerns as far as compromised air quality, flooding, traffic, safety of children, wildlife, and loss of recreational amenity, are still relevant – none of their documents solve any of the concerns. What is vital is that you relate all these concerns to personal lived experience. Do you have friends and family who suffer with respiratory issues? What happens when there is a traffic block on Hamble Lane? How long have you been stuck in traffic? Have you witnessed the safety of pedestrians and school kids being threatened on Hamble Lane? If you live on Satchell Lane what happens to the road and your garden when we get downpours? Why do you use the Airfield – what do you get out of it?

We have spent the summer joining dots: lobbying many of the statutory consultees and drawing their attention to relevant information; empowering HCC Councillors with knowledge of our concerns; submitting Freedom of Information requests around much of the decision making to highlight the lack of assessment process.

This is your time to really show frustration and concern. Keep up to date on Facebook 'Hamble Against Development'.

WE'RE LOOKING FOR A NEW PARISH COUNCILLOR

Closing Date for Applications: 3 December 2023

Following Sarah Lehneis' departure, the Council has a vacancy. If you are interested in the role and would like to contribute to the decisions made by the Council on behalf of Hamble residents, please apply on or before 3 December.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

If you've never been to a parish council meeting, you may assume that parish councillors are a group of (probably older) people who meet now and then in a draughty village hall. Not so. Hamble Parish Council comprises a mix of councillors from different backgrounds, with different interests and of different ages, all committed to volunteering their time to making Hamble a better place to live and work. When something 'big' has or is about to happen, people in the community tend to turn to the Parish Council for support and guidance. One such example of this is the ongoing planning application for gravel extraction at Hamble Airfield. As a parish councillor, you become someone to whom your community will look for help, guidance, and support; a community leader with the ability to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better because of decisions you have helped to make will give you a sense of achievement and pride. Parish Duties

Hamble Parish Council has 12 councillors. The duties and functions of a Parish Council are many and varied, so being a parish councillor is an interesting position to hold. We meet once a month as a full Council (except August) and meetings may last up to 2.5 hours, depending upon the agenda and the items to be discussed. In addition to the full Council meeting, there is also a Planning Committee that meets once a month and an Asset Management Committee that meets every second month. You are not expected to be involved in all committees and there are also other areas of responsibility in which you might want to play a role—such as allotments, communications, the dinghy park, human resources (our team), finance and the budget or our local footpaths. There is also an Annual Parish

meetings of the Council are advertised on the council notice boards, website, and Facebook social media page. Residents can bring to the attention of the Parish Council anything that concerns them, either directly, through a councillor, or through the Clerk. If matters raised are not the responsibility of the Parish Council, the Clerk can bring them to the attention of the proper authority.

As a parish councillor, how much time would I need to commit to Council business?

In addition to the regular meetings, some councillors have specific duties as chairs of committees or working groups, requiring them to attend other meetings to represent the council (e.g., acting as a representative on an outside body, or helping to develop a new project for the community). This could take anywhere between 3 and 10 hours per month, depending on how involved you'd like to be.

RANGER'S REMARKS

Hello again Hamble habitants.

I've been prescribed some anti-gloating cream... I can't wait to rub it in.

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas! That's right, the festive season is fast approaching, so let's warm up with these facts about Christmas and kickstart the festivities!

Who doesn't love Christmas? It's a time filled with excitement, magical stories, sparkling lights, and family reunions.

If you like traditions, then you probably very much enjoy Christmas because it's full of them. These include decorating the Christmas tree, a tradition which was first recorded back in the 16th Century in Germany. Prince Albert, Queen Victoria's husband, was later credited with popularising the tradition in Britain.

The traditional English Christmas dinner includes roast turkey, roast potatoes, Yorkshire pudding, carrots, brussels sprouts, cranberry sauce, and gravy.

Mince pies are a traditional Christmas food in England, dating back to the 13th Century. They originally contained meat, but nowadays are usually made with fruit or vegetables.

Another traditional English Christmas food is plum pudding, also known as Christmas pudding. It is made with dried fruit, suet (beef fat), spices, and alcohol, and is often served with brandy butter or custard sauce.

The custom of decorating houses with evergreens at Christmas began in Tudor times (16th Century). Evergreens were symbols of hope and life during the dark winter months.

On Christmas Day in Japan, people eat KFC. This unusual tradition dates back to 1974 when a KFC in Japan received a strange request for someone to dress up as Santa Claus and deliver buckets of fried chicken to a nearby Christmas party. This became a hit and prompted KFC to launch its first Christmas campaign in 1974. Orders have to be booked two months in

advance and queues stretch out to the street around Christmastime!

Next on my list of fun facts about Christmas is all about the historic St Nicholas. The inspiration for the famous Santa Claus figure originated from the generous Christian bishop, St Nicholas.

During his life, St Nicholas helped the poor and needy by giving money to those in need, saving falsely accused prisoners, and nursing the sick. Following his death, stories about his kindness inspired the jolly and bubbly character of Santa Claus that we know today.

While we usually picture Santa Claus as a round, jolly, bearded man dressed in a big red suit, he hasn't always looked like this. The original Santa Claus was thin and spooky, dressed in Norse huntsman's animal skin. The original depiction was created by Civil War cartoonist Thomas Nast.

It wasn't until the 1920s when the Coca-Cola Company began Christmas advertising and featured the iconic image of the Santa Claus we know and love today.

And finally, during NASA's Gemini 6A space flight on 16 December 1965, Jingle Bells broke a Guinness World Record for being the first song played in space.

The astronauts on the flight played a joke on Mission Control stating that they could see an "object travelling at a low trajectory from north to south", followed by a rendition of the famous Christmas song.

On 12 December we meet at The Beach Hut Cafe for our Christmas lunch. Time for arrival no earlier than 12.45pm for 1pm please.


The Beach Hut Café has done us proud over the years we have been going there and no doubt we will all have a lovely time. Good food, good venue, good company, and maybe a drink or two!

HAMBLE PRIMARY'S CLEAN AIR CAMPAIGN

Hamble Primary School is proud to be one of the first schools in the borough to be taking part in the 'Clean Air Aware' initiative. This is run by Eastleigh Borough Council and Sustrans, with the



aim of making children and their families more aware of air pollution and what we can do to reduce it.

The school's Eco-Committee has been working with a member of the Sustrans team to set up test tubes that collect the particulate matter at different locations around the school. They are waiting for the results to return from the laboratory which will show the extent of air pollution around the school grounds, from the main entrance on Hamble Lane to the woodland area of the field



They also learnt all about lichen and how the colour and type of lichen on trees and branches can be an indicator of the air quality in that area.

This work links tightly with one of the school's Curriculum threads: environment and sustainability, and the Eco-Committee is looking forward to sharing their findings and ideas with the local community.

HAMBLE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERS

So far this autumn we have helped the Hamble Parish estates team to tidy up the waterfront by weeding the flower beds and planting bulbs for



next year. We are also renovating the seating which is heavily used during the summer.

Our efforts to help Eastleigh Borough Council staff with the removal of scrub from the Common are making rapid progress thanks to exceptional turnouts and contingents from local companies, notably Suez and Atkins.

Our annual programme of tasks is displayed on our website and noticeboards posted around the Common. Please note that the meeting place for the parish tasks is at the Roy Underdown Pavilion at SO31 4RN whereas beach cleans and Eastleigh tasks currently meet at the Hamble Point car park while the School Lane car park is unavailable.

HAMBLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The Society's last meeting about 'Old Newspaper Reports of Hamble' was very successful and enjoyable. highlight of the evening was a talk by Hamble policeman, Ray Smout, who helped solve the major crime at the Manor Hotel that led to the longest fraud trial in British history. Ray spoke about his recollections of this major event.



The November meeting also saw the launch of the Society's new booklet, which is a must-read for anyone with a connection with Hamble and is interested in its history. This new booklet is filled with astonishing and remarkable newspaper reports of happenings involving the village and river over the years. It includes reports of smuggling, privateers taking its boats, a shooting at the Victory Inn and the above-mentioned local policeman solving a major crime at the Manor Hotel. There are further reports of a farm arsonist execution, fishermen's deaths, and first woman's seaplane flight, plus notable village events such as a bull fight on the Quay, novelty events at regattas and many more.

ALL ABOUT DARK-BELLIED BRENT **GEESE**

Here on the Solent, we are lucky to have 10% of the world's population of dark-bellied brent geese arriving on our shores every winter - that's around 25,000 birds. Dark-bellied brent geese are our smallest goose, only a little bigger than a mallard, and they fly 3,000 miles to get to the Solent all the way from arctic Siberia.

They are very social birds that gather in large flocks. They form strong bonds, and tend to migrate in family groups, sticking together year on year. They have a grey-brown back, and a black neck, head and bill, with just a small white lacy patch on the neck.

Brent geese eat seagrass, and you'll see them 'bottoms-up' in the water feeding on this tasty plant just like a duck.

As they fly overhead, you can hear them chattering away other, making their glorious guttural crrrronk call. Unlike other geese, they don't fly in V-formations:

instead, you'll see streams of them ribboning across the sky.

It's vital that these special birds get as much time to feed and rest as possible if they are to survive the winter and eventually make the migration back to their arctic breeding grounds. The easiest way to help them is to follow the Bird Aware Solent coastal code: look out for birds, move away if birds become alert, keep dogs alongside and follow requests on signs.


