## WELCOME TO YOUR LATEST NEWSLETTER!

It has been a significant and difficult month for Hamble following the outcome of the Planning Inquiry into the proposed quarry at Hamble Airfield. As many of you will now know, the Inspector granted permission for the development to go ahead – a decision that has caused huge disappointment and concern throughout our community.

On behalf of the Parish Council, I want to extend sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed to the campaign over the past four years. Particular recognition must go to the Hamble Peninsular Residents' Group (HPRG) for the extraordinary amount of time, energy, and professionalism they have devoted to representing local views and preparing evidence throughout the process. The community response has been outstanding, and the decision to approve Cemex's application was made despite the considerable strength of the case put forward.

We are now taking detailed advice from our legal team to understand the options available to us. Once we have a full picture of what a potential Statutory Review might involve – including likely costs and the prospects of success – we will consider appropriate next steps, taking the community's views into account. We are very aware that the Parish Council's main source of funding comes from the community, through the portion of Council Tax (around 5%) that supports local services. It is therefore essential that we weigh up carefully whether a legal challenge has a realistic chance of success. If the quarry development does go ahead, we will still need resources to hold Cemex to account in meeting the conditions attached to the planning consent – such as limits on HGV movements along Hamble Lane and restrictions on working hours – so the question is how best to allocate our resources.

In better news, I'm pleased to report that we've recently been awarded two grants: one for new toddler play equipment at Mount Pleasant, and another for the addition of pickleball court lines at the MUGA at Roy Underdown Pavilion. Both projects came about through local suggestions and community votes, showing once again how active and engaged our residents are in shaping village life.

At this time of year, our focus turns to a few important matters – firstly, Remembrance. One of the greatest privileges of being Chair of the Parish Council is representing Hamble at these events to pay our respects to those who have given their lives, or whose lives have been irrevocably changed, in the defence of our country.

We are also beginning work on the 2026/27 budget, setting priorities for the year ahead. If you would like to understand more about how we make these decisions or to contribute your views, please do come along to our next Full Council meetings on 10 November and 8 December.

Finally, in the coming months we'll be restarting work on the Parish Plan, which will help us define what we want the "Hamble of the Future" to look like, specifically in terms of recreation and green spaces, planning and development, business and employment, and the environment.

Before I close, I'd like to extend warm congratulations to our Clerk, Helen, who has been awarded Highly Commended in the Hampshire Association of Local Councils Awards 2025 – a particularly impressive achievement given that Helen has been in post for just two years.

## HAMBLE AIRFIELD QUARRY PLANNING INQUIRY – OUTCOME AND NEXT STEPS

As many of you will be aware, following the Planning Inquiry held earlier this year, the Planning Inspector has granted permission for the quarry at Hamble Airfield to proceed.

This is extremely disappointing news for everyone in our community – especially those who have worked tirelessly over the last 4+ years to oppose the plans. This outcome is not what any of us wanted, and we share the community's deep concern about the impact this development will have on Hamble and the surrounding area.

As your Parish Council, we are now working closely with the Hamble Peninsular Residents' Group (HPRG) and our legal team to analyse the Inspector's decision in detail and to consider the options available to us. There is now only one possible legal route of challenge open to us – a **Statutory Review** in the High Court. This process is similar to a Judicial Review but follows a specific legal procedure for planning decisions.

A Statutory Review can only be brought forward on **legal grounds** – that is, if it can be demonstrated that the Planning Inspector did not properly apply all the rules and regulations in reaching his decision. If grounds were found to challenge the Inspector's ruling, the Statutory Review process **could** be initiated by Hamble Parish Council on behalf of the village and take up to two years to conclude. If the Review found in our favour, the Inquiry process would be re-run by the Planning Inspectorate – but the quarry application could still ultimately be approved. We are taking advice on the costs and risks of such a step and will consider our options once these are known.

During this process, there will be no opportunity to submit more objections, lobby decision-makers, or further protest against the application. The Review will only consider the material already presented to the Inquiry. As a community, we can no longer influence the decision that has been made, other than through a Statutory Review.

Despite this setback, we have already achieved an enormous amount to date. HPRG has recruited some world experts and authored thousands of pages of evidence. The wider community submitted over 5,700 formal objections – a remarkable demonstration of local concern and unity. HPRG, the schools, residents, businesses, sports/social clubs, and the Parish Council presented a strong, well-evidenced case throughout the planning application process, supported by the ongoing engagement and participation of our community. This decision has been made **in spite of** the determined and coordinated efforts of the community, and everyone involved should be proud of the commitment shown to protecting Hamble.

It is important that we celebrate the determination and hard work of everyone involved in opposing a quarry in the middle of our village. It never was and never will be an acceptable location for a quarry. However, the situation has now changed. What was a hypothetical possibility of a quarry is now a certain reality unless we can find another way of stopping it or at least delaying it.

We will continue to keep the community informed as we work with our legal team to determine the most appropriate next steps – please keep an eye on our website and social media channels for updates.

## UPDATE FROM YOUR COUNCIL: WHAT WE'VE BEEN WORKING ON

- Councillors Chris Jones and Andy Thompson (with support from the Parish Council team) have completed the annual inspection of the parish footpaths, checking routes for accessibility, safety, and maintenance issues.



- We have reinstated the handrail at the Foreshore with help from Councillor Ian Underdown.
- Dinghy Park Disposal Notices were recently issued and have proved successful. We would like to thank all those who have contributed to the effective management of the park.
- A slipway clean was completed in early October.

## MOUNT PLEASANT PLAY AREA: YOUR VOTES ARE IN!

A huge thank you to everyone who took part in our recent community vote to help choose new play equipment for Mount Pleasant.

Following the wider play area refurbishment earlier this year, we were given the opportunity to apply for grant funding to include something new for younger children. As part of this exercise, we asked the community to vote for their favourite option from three designs.

We're delighted to share that Option 1 – the Large Toddler Multiplay – was the clear winner, receiving 68% of the 107 votes cast.



Even better news – our grant application has been approved by Eastleigh Borough Council, which means we can go ahead with installing the new toddler multiplay.

We're now awaiting confirmation from our contractor on equipment lead times so we can set an installation date. We hope the work will be completed before Christmas, although this will depend on delivery and scheduling.

We'll continue to share updates on our website and social media channels once dates are confirmed.

Thank you again to everyone who took part and shared their views – it's great to see the community helping to shape improvements to local spaces.

## RANGER'S REMARKS

Hello Hamble Habitants.

I've got to admit it wasn't easy getting over my addiction to the hokey-cokey... but I've turned myself around and that's what it's all about.

With the return of the cooler wetter weather, a lovely stroll through the woods, pastures, or parks of Hamble will have the added bonus of the annual emergence of a huge variety of fungi.

Fungi are one of the most diverse organisms on Earth and contribute to many aspects of life as we know it. They're the most populous kingdom on the planet – an estimated 3.8million fungi exist worldwide – and yet, more than 90% of them are currently unknown to science. Strange as it sounds, some mushrooms are bioluminescent – meaning they emit light!

A fungus is neither plant nor animal and belongs to its own 'fungi kingdom'. But, genetically speaking, they're more closely related to animals than plants. Like us, they 'breathe in' oxygen and give out CO2. Unlike plants, they don't need sunlight to reproduce. Instead, they rely on other organisms for food – just like animals. Also, their cell walls contain chitin, which is found in the exoskeletons of insects, the shells of crustaceans, and the beaks of octopuses.

Sure, we've a lot less in common with a toadstool than a chimp. But next time you're tucking into mushrooms and thinking about how meaty they taste, don't be too surprised. They're closer to animal life than most people think.

Last month the grounds team started work alongside Hamble Valley Tree Services on reducing the large area of invasive laurel along the stream in Mercury Gardens. This necessary work was carried out in response to the Parish Council's recent official tree survey and a separate parish biodiversity action plan.



Cherry laurel is bad for biodiversity because it is an invasive, fast-growing, evergreen plant that out-competes native species by shading them out, creating dense monocultures with little value to wildlife. This prevents native woodland plants from growing and disrupts the ecosystem. Its berries are spread by birds, and its foliage and seeds contain toxic cyanide compounds that are harmful to animals.

Now is the perfect time of year to give bird boxes a thorough clean. When you're sure they are no longer occupied, you need to get rid of any parasites (or their eggs) before a new family of birds can move in, particularly as these unwelcome guests can be very harmful to chicks and their chances of survival. While birds will clean bird boxes themselves before nesting, it's best to make sure they're completely clear. Use boiling water to kill any parasites and let the box dry out thoroughly before replacing the lid. Insecticides and powders must not be used.

I call it a lift; however, my American friend calls it an elevator... I guess we were raised differently.

### **PICKLEBALL LINES COMING TO THE MUGA AT ROY UNDERDOWN PAVILION**

We're pleased to share that Hamble Parish Council has been awarded grant funding to add pickleball lines to one of the Multi Use Games Areas (MUGAs) at the Roy Underdown Pavilion.

This improvement follows a request from a local pickleball group and will allow the courts to be used for this increasingly popular sport. Pickleball is one of the UK's fastest-growing activities, with an estimated 35,000 players nationwide and a 58% increase in venues across England over the past year.

The funding covers the installation of the court markings only – the pickleball groups using the facility will provide their own nets when playing. Work to add the new lines is expected to take place over the coming weeks, weather and contractor availability permitting.

We're delighted to be able to support another way for residents to enjoy being active and making use of our local sports facilities.

## FORESHORE CLOCK PERMITS

Each year the Council sells permits for the Foreshore Car Park which allow permit-holders 4 hours of free parking, 365 days a year. 200 permits are available on a first come, first serve basis.

The annual parking permit charge for 2026 will remain at £25 – less than 7p per day. Any changes to the hourly parking charges in The Square will be in line with Eastleigh Borough Council's charges.

Parking permits will be on sale online from Monday 1 December at [hambleparishcouncil.gov.uk/clock-permit](http://hambleparishcouncil.gov.uk/clock-permit). Permits will be available to collect from the Parish Office from Tuesday 2 December. Unfortunately, we are unable to post permits.
