There is a great deal to update you on this month, so let me start with some personal news. I am delighted to have been re-elected as Chair of the Parish Council for another 12 months, with Cllr Simon Hand as Vice Chair. It is a privilege to serve the village, and I am looking forward to the year ahead.

It was a pleasure to welcome residents, community groups and local organisations to the Annual Parish Assembly on 6 May at Hamble Primary School. The Community Showcase beforehand was a real highlight – it was wonderful to learn more about some of the organisations we are so fortunate to have in the village, and I would like to thank all the stallholders for giving up their time to take part.

The evening also saw the announcement of this year's Community Awards, which were once again a reminder of just how strong our community is. Congratulations to our winners – Emma Westmacott, the Mercury Hub, and Liam Taylor and Year 11 at The Hamble School – and to all those who were nominated. Choosing the winners was no easy task. Thank you to Helen and the team for organising such a successful evening, and to everyone who came along.

I would also like to congratulate Wetwheels Hamble on receiving the King's Award for Voluntary Service – the highest honour given to voluntary groups in the UK. Over the past 10 years, their volunteers have enabled more than 15,000 disabled people to enjoy life-changing experiences on the water. This recognition is thoroughly deserved.

Turning to Hamble Airfield, we now have a date for the Oral Hearing in the Statutory Review: Tuesday 16 June. This represents the next critical step in this process, and we will share further details as soon as we have them – please keep an eye on our website, social media channels, noticeboards and the next newsletter.

On a lighter note, it is lovely to see the village pub cricket match making a reappearance on 7 June. All proceeds will be going to the Hamble Peninsular Residents' Group to help cover the costs they incurred in the fight against the quarry. It promises to be a great day, so please come along, show your support, and put your hands in your pockets for a very good cause.

At the time of going to print, I was very sad to hear of the death of Bill Pepper, who greatly contributed to village organisations and served on the Parish Council for 49 years. On behalf of the Council, I would like to express our sincere condolences to Bill's family and friends. We will pay a fuller tribute to Bill's significant impact on our community in the July newsletter.

Finally, we are still looking for one more councillor to join the team. No previous experience is needed – what matters is that you care about Hamble and can spare a few hours a month. The deadline for applications is 4 June, and you can find details on our website or by contacting Helen at the Parish Office.

Thank you to everyone who came along to this year's Annual Parish Assembly on Wednesday 6 May at Hamble Primary School.

The evening began with a Community Showcase, giving local organisations the chance to set up stands and share information about what they do. It was a great opportunity for residents to find out more about the groups and services available in the village, and to meet some of the people behind them. Thank you to Hamble Valley Regatta, Hamble Flower Club, the Mercury Hub, Hamble Conservation Volunteers, Hamble Players, Hamble Good Neighbours and Hamble Lifeboat for taking part and representing the best of what our community has to offer.

CELEBRATING OUR 2026 COMMUNITY AWARD WINNERS

This year's Annual Community Awards were announced at the Parish Assembly on 6 May, recognising the individuals and groups who have made an outstanding contribution to life in Hamble. The quality of nominations was once again exceptional, and the Council had a difficult task in choosing the winners. Every nominee has made a real difference to our village, and all would have been worthy winners.

The Individual Award was presented to **Emma Westmacott**, who has led the campaign against the proposed quarry at Hamble Airfield for many years as part of the Hamble Peninsular Residents' Group (HPRG). Emma has dedicated a huge amount of time to campaigning on behalf of the village, and her determination and persistence have been central to the community's response to the quarry threat. On receiving the award, Emma was keen to share it with the wider HPRG team, paying particular tribute to Matthew Waters, Jane Pyle, Rob Hillman, Tony Peter, Christian Walton and Jan Freeman as the core group who have driven the campaign alongside her, as well as to the many residents who have pulled together. As Emma put it, she would never have driven the campaign as hard without their support. It was a generous and fitting reflection of the community spirit that the awards are designed to celebrate.

The Assembly itself included the Chair's Annual Report from Cllr Chris Jones, covering the Council's work over the past year and priorities for the year ahead. If you were not able to attend, or would like to watch it again, a recording is available on YouTube: <https://bit.ly/4dKmRL4>



The highlight of the evening was the announcement of this year's Community Awards winners, celebrating the individuals and groups who go above and beyond for Hamble. You can read more about the winners and nominees below.

Thank you again to everyone who attended. The Assembly is your meeting, and we appreciate those who gave up their evening to be part of it. We look forward to seeing you again next year.

The Group Award went to the **Mercury Hub**, recognised for the remarkable contribution its volunteers make to life in Hamble. The Hub is open six days a week and offers far more than a book exchange. From its games afternoons and book club to craft groups such as the Quilling Group and the Hamble Hookers, the Hub provides a warm, welcoming space where friendships are formed and residents of all ages can find company, support and activity. Volunteers give their time freely and tirelessly, and the Hub has also played an active role in village causes, including raising an impressive £1,277.30 to support the fight against the proposed quarry at Hamble Airfield. It is a true community asset, and this award recognises the many people who make it possible.

The Young Person's Award was presented to **Liam Taylor and Year 11 at The Hamble School**. Liam and his fellow students organised a charity football match entirely of their own initiative, raising just under £2,000 for Maggie's Centres, a charity supporting people affected by cancer. Liam took responsibility for securing the Headteacher's approval to use the school name, negotiated use of the Hamble Club ground, coordinated advertising and poster design, and arranged for staff to volunteer as match officials and team managers. The event also included a minute's silence in memory of a member of staff from The Hamble School who had recently passed away from cancer – a moment that showed real empathy and maturity. It was an impressive achievement and a credit to Liam, his classmates and the school.



The Council would also like to recognise all of this year's nominees, each of whom has contributed something valuable to the life of our village.

Peter Hyde was nominated for his tireless voluntary work, both as a member of the Hamble Conservation Volunteers and through his own daily efforts. Peter is a familiar sight around the village, carrying out litter-picking sweeps, reporting vandalism and fly-tipping, and maintaining bird boxes to protect local songbirds. His wildlife photography, regularly shared on social media, has helped raise awareness of the rare and visiting species found in and around Hamble.

Georgie Hand was nominated in recognition of her eight years as Chair of Hamble Good Neighbours. Georgie stepped into the role at a critical time, when the organisation was struggling due to illness and a shortage of volunteers, and rebuilt it from the ground up. She modernised working practices, led the transition to digital record-keeping, recruited and supported volunteer drivers, and ensured the charity met current standards. During the pandemic, Georgie was instrumental in organising emergency support, including shopping deliveries and weekly companionship calls for isolated residents.

Maureen (Mo) Thomas was nominated for her work as a volunteer driver with Beacon Good Neighbours, helping residents who are unable to drive themselves to medical appointments. Mo is a caring and community-minded person who gives her time willingly. Even while awaiting a total knee replacement herself, she arranged for her husband Ian to take over the driving so that clients would not be let down.

In the Group category, **Hamble Players** was nominated for bringing the community together through affordable, inclusive theatre. With four productions a year and a much-loved annual pantomime, the group provides opportunities for people of all ages and backgrounds to get involved, whether on stage or behind the scenes. Hamble

Players also supports local and national charities through ticket sale proceeds, including recent contributions to Hound Basics Food Bank and Simon Says.

Hamble Lifeboat was nominated for its outstanding commitment to both lifesaving and community engagement. As a fully independent lifeboat station, it relies entirely on local support, and the crew regularly give their time to school visits, community events, open days and water safety education. The lifeboat's visible, reassuring presence on the river is a source of pride and safety for the whole village.

Thank you to everyone who submitted a nomination, and to all the nominees for what they do for Hamble. We are already looking forward to the next Community Awards and hope even more of you will get involved – whether by nominating someone, supporting the event, or continuing the work that makes Hamble such a special place to live.



CLOCK PERMITS AND DINGHY PARK SPACES STILL AVAILABLE

Foreshore Clock Permits for 2026 are still available. The permits allow Hamble residents to park for up to four hours per day in the Foreshore Car Park, and cost just £25 for the year – under 7p per day. PUBLIC ART PROJECT IN HAMBLE – COMING SOON

Eastleigh Borough Council has allocated funding from its public art budget for a new commission in Hamble. The money comes from developer contributions ring-fenced specifically for public art – it is not being funded by Parish Council money, nor your precept.

Over the coming weeks, the Parish Council will be consulting with the community on what this commission could look like, and we wanted to give you some notice so that you have time to think about it.

When people hear "public art," they often picture a bronze figure on a plinth. But it can be so much more than that, and we would encourage everyone to think broadly about what this could become.

Hamble has no shortage of stories to draw on. The Venerable Bede wrote about our double high tides over 1,300 years ago. Seamen used to carve a mark on the door of St Andrew's Church before setting sail – and carved a cross when they returned safely. Some never did. Hamble built Spitfires, trained pilots, and was home to the ATA women who ferried aircraft across the country during the war. And more recently, Hamble's schoolchildren stood up at the quarry inquiry and spoke with a passion and clarity that moved everyone who heard them.

But this does not have to be about looking back. Hamble has always been a place people set out from – monks in 720 AD, warships to Crécy, Spitfires during the war, pilots training, yachts racing. An installation could capture that sense of setting out, of beginnings, of what comes next. It could incorporate our schoolchildren's vision of what Hamble should look like in 2075 – their words, their drawings, their hopes for the future.

It could include a digital or interactive element – a QR code that unlocks stories from residents past and present, a sound installation triggered by movement or tide, or something that invites people to contribute over time, making the piece a platform rather than just an object. It could be something solar-powered that lights up at dusk, or tide-powered – a quiet demonstration that Hamble is thinking about its future relationship with the water and landscape around it. It could even be something that

evolves with the seasons, designed to weather and change over time, never quite finished – like the village itself.

Elsewhere in the country, communities have commissioned interactive installations that respond to tidal patterns, pieces that light up as people walk past, or functional designs – artistic seating, viewing structures, gathering points – that become part of daily life rather than something you walk past.

We could involve our schoolchildren, our sailing clubs and our local groups in the design or creation process, making it genuinely a community project. We could create something visitors come specifically to see, supporting our local pubs, restaurants and businesses. Or it could be something quieter and more personal.

Please look out for the consultation on our website, social media and noticeboards in coming weeks. We would rather take our time and get this right than rush into something that does not do justice to the village. Your ideas are welcome and wanted.

- **Line marking:** Line marking has been carried out in the Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) and the car park, keeping both looking smart and clearly marked for the summer.

RANGER'S REMARKS

Hello Hamble Habitants.

I used to think that orthopaedic shoes were overrated... but I stand corrected.

Here we are already in the first summer month of June. In June, UK woods and gardens are vibrant with summer life, featuring blooming roses, fragrant honeysuckle, and active wildlife. Highlights include bustling bees, butterflies, newly fledged birds, and wildflowers like oxeye daisies. Regular readers of this column will be aware of my passion for biodiversity, and the Parish Council, with the help of our awesome volunteers, is striving to enhance and protect biodiversity within the Hamble-le-Rice parish. The grounds team are constantly adding more native species of trees, flowers, and shrubs in a concerted effort to encourage even more native wildlife into our village.

Speaking of wildlife, did you know that Britain has approximately 59 different species of butterflies, many of which, with a keen eye, you can spot throughout the year? This is something great to do if you also love bird spotting, as it nicely adds to your collection. However, their population is in decline due to the reduction in their natural habitat in addition to an increase in the use of chemicals. With their varied and vibrant colours, elegance and fragile natures, there will always be something utterly compelling about butterflies.

To ensure Hamble is blooming through the summer, the grounds team have been working alongside the Hamble Conservation Volunteers to plant hundreds of colourful flowers around the village, to fill the various planters and flowerbeds. Be sure to stop and spend a minute when you are passing one of these planters to enjoy the beauty they have to offer, and hopefully feel them lift your spirits and get in the mood for summer.



Dog owners in Hamble will readily testify to the many benefits of owning a dog, which include reduced stress, anxiety and depression, easing loneliness, encouraging exercise and playfulness, and even improving your cardiovascular health. Another positive benefit, on a more practical level, is being successfully trialled by the team at Canine Assisted Pest Eradication – a groundbreaking

project training detection dogs (previously used to detect underground water leaks) to use their extremely powerful noses to sniff out the tree pathogen *Phytophthora ramorum*, a disease that can kill more than 150 plant species. Following the success of the initial trials, Forest Research is now exploring the use of detection dogs to help combat other pests and diseases such as *Ips typographus*, also known as the eight-toothed spruce bark beetle, fulfilling commitments set out in the GB plant biosecurity strategy.

I tried organising a hide-and-seek tournament... but good players are hard to find.

LONELINESS AWARENESS WEEK: 15-21 JUNE

Loneliness Awareness Week takes place from 15 to 21 June this year, and while the word "loneliness" can feel like it applies to someone else, the reality is that most of us experience it at some point – whether after a bereavement, a change in circumstances, retirement, or simply during those weeks where you realise you have not had a proper conversation with anyone in days. One of the best things about living in a village like Hamble is that there are more doors open to you than you might think.

The Mercury Hub is open six days a week and is far more than a book exchange. There are games afternoons, a book club, craft groups and a warm welcome from the volunteers – and you do not need to be a "member" to walk in. The Hamble Ladies' Group meets on the second Tuesday of each month at the Priory Centre, and visitors are always welcome. The Hamble Flower Club meets on the second Monday at the Memorial Hall. St Andrew's Church holds regular services and runs the Place 2B coffee mornings at the Priory Centre. Hamble Good Neighbours can help with transport to appointments if getting out and about is the barrier.

Sometimes it is even simpler than joining a group. Next time you are at the Foreshore, take a seat on the Ray Sedgwick Friendship Bench – it is there for exactly this reason; a place to sit and say hello to whoever sits down next to you. Pop into one of the village cafes or pubs for a coffee. A small conversation with a familiar face can make more of a difference than you might expect.

If you are not sure what is going on locally, the Facebook groups Hamble le Rice is Nice, Hamble Events and Hamble Neighbours are a good place to start. They are friendly, active, and regularly share details of events and get-togethers happening in the village.

Loneliness Awareness Week is run by the Marmalade Trust, and this year marks the campaign's tenth anniversary. Their message is a simple one: loneliness is a normal human experience, and connection is the answer. In Hamble, we are fortunate to have a community full of people and groups ready to welcome you. The hardest part is usually just turning up.
